

The banks are difficult to deal with nowadays and want near perfect credit ratings but interest rates are at all time lows in the low 4% range for a 30 year fixed mortgage.

The number of real estate transactions nation wide fell again for the month of September but remember all real estate is local so national averages really don't mean a whole lot to us living in Massachusetts. Going one step farther, real estate activity in Massachusetts does not necessarily translate to Hudson, MA.

I think that activity will not increase greatly for us until Congress can get its act together and resolve the job situation and who knows when that will be. 

Your retirement portfolio checkup, part 2

In the <u>first part</u> of this article, we looked at the allocation of your portfolio, reviewed when to rebalance, and made sure that you weren't sending the tax man any more money than necessary. Now we'll move on to Steps 2 looking at your holdings and reviewing them in the context of your overall retirement investment goals.

Step 2: Review your funds

If your holdings are limited to index funds, there's probably not much you need to do beyond rebalancing. But if you hold actively managed funds, take a few minutes to run down this checklist for each fund: Has the portfolio manager changed recently? Different managers have different styles, and a fund's volatility and performance may be very different under new leadership even if its investment objective hasn't changed. A manager change isn't necessarily a red flag, but think of it as a yellow one: something to keep an eye on.

Check for *style drift*. Go to the fund company's website and call up its page on the fund, or head over to Morningstar's website. Look for the *style box*, which looks like a little Rubik's Cube. That will tell you where the fund currently falls on the growth vs. value and small-cap vs. large-cap spectrums. Make sure it's where you think it ought to be -- if you bought a fund thinking it would fill the large-cap value niche in your portfolio, but it's more of a mid-cap growth fund these days (this sort of drift is more common than you'd think), consider finding another fund.

Review the fund's performance. Don't just look at the fund's total returns -- although that's definitely the place to start. Download the fund's most recent annual report. Inside will be a short interview with the fund's manager, called something like "Management Discussion & Analysis" (it's legally required). If recent performance has been stinky -- or unusually good -- it's worth finding out why. That interview should help you find the answer. It probably goes without saying, but a fund with an extended record of stinky performance should be sold. (This isn't like stock investing, where you buy on the dips.)

Next time we'll take stock of your stocks.

Condo Calendar

- Switch overhead fans to the winter setting with the button up.
- Replace the two AA batteries that run the LuxPro PSP511 thermostat. If the batteries die, according to the LuxPro tech, the thermostat defaults to about 40° and will continue to turn the furnace off and on. You have 30 seconds to swap the batteries before your program is lost.
- Replace the 9V batteries in the smoke detectors once a year. They are at the 2 bedrooms, dining/living area, loft, and the often forgotten basement.
- Replace carbon monoxide detectors 9V batteries.
- Replace the battery in the outdoor garage door opener key pad.
- Check your smoke detector-- push the button, perhaps with a broom handle, and make sure they are still functioning.
- Turn-off outside water faucets

Don't wrap or cover your air conditioner over the winter – that could cause serious condensation problems.

Energy Audit

If you signed up for this check on the energy efficiency of your home and haven't heard back from the **Conservation Services**

Group, call them at 508-836-9500. The response there has been varied, so make sure you talk to someone who understands that you're from Quail Run and would like to know when they will visit your place. The big thing the audit will cover is sealing (**for free**) any areas where outside air is leaking in and/or inside air going out.

The Ebens called and left voice mail; a call back was received several days later and we had our audit.

Bog News

Questions have been raised regarding Alpine's fees. All management companies base their basic contract price on a standard set of conditions. They know what is needed to handle each owner's account. They usually also take care of contracts for lawns, trash, snow removal, property maintenance, and deal with routine calls from owners and their problems. Any significant deviation from this has to be compensated in some fashion.

When Alpine was originally hired as our management company, no one anticipated the very costly project we would face now. The extra fee that Alpine charges for special major projects is a standard clause, similar to almost all local companies, and that contract has been renewed annually. We hope that there will not be any major expenses in the future. Per our contract, we are not charged a project management fee unless the project is over \$10,000, and there have been numerous projects that fit under that. For example, there was the need to upgrade a hot water tank in the clubhouse which didn't trigger an extra cost. With the next renewal, the Board will seek a different arrangement, not necessarily a cap. No company can survive performing unlimited extra work for a fixed amount of money.

For our additional cost, Quail Run has had the equal of an additional business manager. Alpine (especially Cathy Birnbrich) started working with engineers on the roof problem as soon as damages were noted and coordinated the initial problems into a coherent solution. She ironed out inconsistencies between the insurance proceeds, repairs, the specs, and the contractor. Many owners have contacted her with concerns and questions of a "How will this affect me?" nature, and she has been the "go to" person for almost every interaction between contractors, supervisors, and owners. She has set up meetings with various people, the Board, engineers and bidders, referred the correct papers to our attorneys for their review, made sure that everything dovetails, and is here multiple times per week while the work is ongoing. Coordination is done, such as that the lawn irrigation is turned off selectively in some areas while the roofers are there and shingles and other materials are on site, for example.

Alpine keeps in touch with the bank that we have our line of credit with, and checks to be sure that we have adequate funds transferred to our account as needed.

They verify that invoices are correct, check with the engineer that it was correctly done, and then pay it. Alpine has to coordinate the final balance, allocate the correct charge to each owner, collect our payments either as a lump sum or calculate how much each owner is expected to pay monthly for the balance of the loan period and put the correct entry on each owner's account for that time period and see that it is collected and remitted to the bank timely (estimated at 10 more years).

Change in Board Members

With the resignation of **Dianne Potter**, the Board met under the authority of Article IV, Section 7 of the By Laws of Quail Run, and has elected Allen Boemer to serve as the fifth member of the Board.

Several owners were considered for the position. Allen was selected at this time because of the ongoing roof replacement project and his background as a licensed, practicing architect. It was felt that his input at this time going forward would be most helpful. He has been a member of the Board in the past.

With this appointment, the positions have been slightly changed. Pat Ritter Waltrup will assume the position of Clerk, Allen Boemer is the new Member at Large. The other positions are unchanged.



WACHUSETT MOUNTAIN STATE RESERVATION

Rising above the surrounding



This is a good place to enjoy the fall foliage. Whether you have never been there or are familiar with the area, it is a must see. The state has just spent more than \$7.5 million for the restoration and reconstruction of the reservation. \$2.5 million was used to revitalize the summit area. The parking area at the summit has been eliminated and a new one has been constructed just below the summit before the pond. The summit is now pedestrian friendly. One addition is a tower with a ramp that rises 10 feet. This will give an even better view (on a clear day) of Mt. Monadnock, the Berkshires and the Boston skyline. The road to the top has been fixed and the Bicentennial Trail has been restored. There are 17 miles of hiking and walking trails within the park.



Begin your visit with a stop at the visitor center to get trail and area maps and other information. There are view points on the road to the top and also picnic tables. Wachusett Mountain has been called the jewel of the state park system.

The ranger on duty told me that they hope to have the restoration completed and the


road open by Columbus Day. If they don't have the project finished by then you can still get to the summit by hiking or, much more fun, taking the ski lift from the lodge in the ski area. This provides a spectacular view of fall foliage and it is only a short walk from the top of the lift to the summit.

Directions: Take Rt. 2 west to exit 25. At the top of the exit ramp take a right onto 140. Drive 2.1 miles and take a right onto Mile Hill Rd. Drive 0.5 miles to a split and take the left fork onto Mountain Rd. Drive 1.25 miles to the entrance on the right. (Do not go into the ski area unless you want to ride the lift.)

As an added bonus to this trip you may want to visit the Old Mill on rt.2A in Westminster. Take a left when you leave Mt. Wachusett and retrace the way you came in but cross over Rt. 2 and in a mile or so you will see the

mill on the right. We like to stop here just to watch the falls and the ducks and geese on the pond, hike behind the pond, and take a few pictures. There is an excellent restaurant here and a country store gift shop.



Exercise and Arthritis





them are going to disappear, as evidenced by the closing of Borders bookstores. Judging by the miniscule size of the Boston Globe, newspapers are not far behind. The two leading e-book readers are the Amazon Kindle and the Barnes and Noble Nook. Each has advantages. The Kindle is lower cost at \$114, has a battery life of two months, and can hold 3500 books. However, the display is monochrome only and is hard to read in low light levels. Amazon now sells more e-books than paper books and has about one million titles available. The Nook costs about \$250, has color and can be read in low light or dark. You can also read email and surf the web on the Nook. Battery life is about one month and there are two million titles available for purchase. In both cases it takes about one minute to download a book. We decided on the Nook because of the low light capability and the color capability. Soon newspapers and magazines will be popular on e-readers.

There are large numbers of free books available on the internet, at http://books.google.com/, librivox.org, www.audiobooksforfree-@com, and elsewhere. Amazon and Barnes and Noble also have free offerings. Hundreds of free MP3 music numbers are available on Amazon. Go to Amazon at: www.amazon.com and type "free mp3 downloads" in the search field at the top.

All plastic is not the same American credit cards are highly standardized and worked everywhere in the world. However they may not work everywhere any longer. Newly issued credit cards in Europe and elsewhere now include an embedded microprocessor. American credit cards will not work in the new readers that require the embedded microprocessor. If the merchant can enter the card number manually the old style cards will still work. Fortunately most ATMs world-wide

still accept credit cards without the embedded microprocessor, although this will change. Bottom line: Check first with your card company and/or take plenty of cash next time you travel off-shore.

Phaseout of Incandescent Light Bulbs In 2007 the federal government passed legislation to phase out incandescent bulbs by 2012 to 2014. The efficiency standards will start with a ban on 100-watt bulbs in January 2012 and end with a ban on 40-watt bulbs in January 2014. Halogen, light-emitting diode (LED), and compact fluorescent lights (CFL) will be legal. CFLs are probably the best compromise between cost and efficiency, as the others are relatively expensive.

Smart Phone Hacking

As smart phones become more popular, they inevitably become the targets of hacking. One hacking approach is to offer apps that contain a hacking virus. This is not a problem on the Apple iPhone because it is a closed system. Apple tests and qualifies all apps on the iPhone. It is much more of a problem on other smart phones which have an open architecture, and indeed a number of hacking apps have been found and removed. Another hacking approach is to eavesdrop on the data being sent and received at your smartphone. Because of this, you should not assume that web access from your smartphone is secure.

Identity Theft: One Stop Shopping A new web site has been established to provide one-stop shopping for everything about identity theft. It is at: www.idtheft info.org; established by the Consumer Federation of America, a advocacy organization of 300 consumer advocacy groups. It contains extensive information about how to avoid identity theft, and how to clean up the mess if your identity is stolen for both individuals and businesses. There are phone numbers for consumer hot lines, counseling, advice, and victim help.

Another way to recover a file A file deleted by mistake, can be recovered from the Recycle Bin, select it, then restore. For Vista or Windows 7, another way to recover a deleted file is to recover a previous version. Right click on the file name and select Recover Previous Version. Several alternatives are available for recovery. The previous version recovery is only available if the file has been changed since the last Restore Point was created.
