# **Board Of Governors (BOG) News**

After several years, the Board is finally able to go ahead with fully repainting Quail Run. Repainting has been on the agenda of almost every Board since the developer turned control over to us. At first, keeping the wood trim repaired and repainted took up a large amount of the budget. The costs associated were tracked and it was felt that the least expensive course was to aggressively replace the progressively deteriorating wood with PVC. This required an up-front assessment but we are saving money on this trade off. Otherwise our condo fees would continue to rise simply for this maintenance.

What will be painted includes the front door and areas by the kitchen front and porch. You will have to leave the door open for a while to allow paint on it to dry. The porch ceiling will be power washed and varnished where needed. Some remaining wood trim on the porch may need replacing. The only purpose of painting PVC is to hide nails as PVC itself does not need any further

work. Only that trim where the nails are easily seen will be done, so those areas high up on the dormers or peaks of the roof will be left alone. We do not want painters walking on the roof!

As part of this project, we will also have the cement siding painted. The siding was expected to last for years with nothing more than painting, but some has shifted and cracks and gaps have opened that do need replacement or caulking. (Continued on page 10)




# HEALTHY LIVING

## Heatstroke

We just returned from a trip to British Columbia to see the incredible Canadian Rockies and



Heatstroke is the progression of two worsening heat-related conditions--heat cramps and heat exhaustion. Heatstroke is caused by prolonged exposure to high temperatures or by doing physical activity in hot weather. High humidity and certain health problems and some medications increase your risk of heatstroke. Heatstroke symptoms include: high body temperature, lack of sweating (but in heatstroke brought on by strenuous exercise the skin feels moist), nausea and vomiting, flushed skin, rapid breathing, racing heart rate, headache, confusion, muscle cramps or weakness and possibly unconsciousness.

Before you experience those symptoms you can treat the condition yourself by drinking cool, nonalcoholic beverages, getting into an air-conditioned area or taking a cool shower. If your symptoms persist, seek medical attention immediately.

Treatment of heatstroke includes taking immediate action to cool the overheated person such as helping the person move to a shaded location and remove excess clothing, placing ice packs or cold, wet towels on the person's head, neck, armpits and groin and misting the person with water while a fan is blowing on him or her.

We didn't get heatstroke from our long walk to Kootenai Falls and the hanging bridge, but we sure had red faces and great thirst.

## **Quail Run Real Estate News**

Ouail Run, like much of rest of the real estate world seems to be stuck in the summer doldrums. The last closed sales were 12D Strawberry and 6C Rotherham just a week or so ago but they had been under agreement from some time ago. More recently however there have been very few people looking to buy. My web site, activeadultliving.com has had very few visitors and those that did get onto the site all have a house to sell. However some of the major indicators, e.g. Case/ Shiller, are showing increased buyer activity nationwide but that does not seem to be affecting our little niche here at QR. Let's hope we start to see some trickle down effect sooner rather than later. Another positive nationwide indicator shows an increase in housing starts and a miniscule rise in home prices. Not great but better than the reverse.

I understand there is some concern by home owners that the cost of Obamacare may be partially borne by homeowners when they sell. There will be a 3.85% transfer tax BUT it will only be on owners who make a profit of over \$500,000 (jointly) and only on that amount over the \$500,000 for people whose adjusted gross income is over \$235,000. So I doubt any Quail Runners will be affected in any way by that concern.

# When a spouse dies, credit cards do not simply transfer

The practice of canceling cards issued to a deceased spouse is common.

Being a user on an account opened by a spouse doesn't automatically transfer the credit to you. Similarly, if money is owed on the card, you technically wouldn't be personally be responsible, the estate would. If you applied for the cards jointly, they would stay active upon a spouses passing.

The credit card company said that they strive to treat family members with sympathy during this difficult time, a spokesman said. "When we are notified that the responsible cardholder passes away, we close the account. The account is then referred to a special group of representatives knowledgeable in probate matters, who may contact a family member to obtain information on the probate estate. If a surviving spouse is interested in having a credit card account, we invite him or her to apply for a new account."

Federal law requires applicants to be judged on their own merits, so the surviving spouse has to start from square one. That's going to seem unfair to an awful lot of people, particularly those who were the ones

paying the bills.

# **Plumbing Problems**

Recently a resident had a very expensive and unnerving experience with pluming problem that should have been quickly and cheaply solved.

Make sure any plumber you contact is familiar with Quail Run and our water and sewer set up. Our units do not have their own master shut off valve. The master shut off valves are located in one of the end units.



Each unit does have a set of shut off valves in the basement ceiling. If you haven't already, this would be a good time to tag the shut offs.

Curley Plumbing, 152 Manning St., Hudson, 978-562-2742, has done extensive work here at Quail Run and resolved

the resident's issue by replacing a 10¢ washer.

Selectmen approved water and sewer rates that will result in a \$6.53 increase on the average quarterly bill.

The rates are for the 2013 fiscal year, which starts July 1, and will first show up on August water and sewer bills. Selectmen approved a sewer rate of \$4.91 per 100 cubic feet, a 3.4 percent jump from this year. Hudson has a tiered water rate, but the average rate will be \$3.13 per 100 cubic feet, up 4.3 percent from this year. The average quarterly water and sewer bills are expected to go from \$174.38 to \$180.90.





# Area Highlights

## ORCHARD HOUSE/ALCOTT HOME 100th ANNIVERSARY



On May 27, 1912 the Orchard House, the Concord home where Louisa May Alcott wrote her famous novel, "Little Women", opened as a museum. This year marks the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of this museum. The museum sees 50,000 visitors a year.

After moving twenty-two times in nearly thirty years, the Alcotts finally found their most permanent home at Orchard House in Concord, where they lived from 1858 to 1877. Louisa wrote "Little Women" in 1868. The home is most noted for being where Louisa wrote and set her beloved classic. Fortunately, there have been no major structural changes to the house since the Alcott's time, and on-going preservation efforts adhere to the highest standards of authenticity. About 80% of the furnishings on display were owned by the Alcotts so that the rooms look much like they did when the family lived there. A walk through the house is like a walk through "Little Women."

All visits to the house are by guided tour. You will be introduced to objects important to the family and to the family members themselves. An interesting video tells the story of the family's years in the home, and differences between the "March" family in the book and the real-life Alcotts.

The Alcott home is open year-round. From November 1-March 31: Monday-Friday 11 to 3, Saturday 10-4:30, Sunday 1-4:30. April 1-October 31: Monday-Saturday 10-4:30, Sunday 1-4:30. Closed Easter, Christmas, Jan 1 and 2. No reservations are needed for groups fewer than 10 persons.

Admission: Seniors and college students with ID \$8, Adults \$9, Youth 6-17 \$5.

There is a Museum Store that stocks a wide variety of collectibles, gifts, books, and educational materials related to the Alcotts and their world. For more information call 978-369-4188.

Directions: Rte 62 from Hudson to Concord, follow Main Street until it ends at the "green." Bear right onto Lexington Road. Follow Lexington Road, left at the fork with Cambridge Turnpike. The Concord Museum will be on your right. Approximately .5 mile, Orchard House will be on your left. Address 399 Lexington Road. Park in the Wayside Lot on Hawthorne Lane.

**NOTE:** If you do not have a National Park Senior Pass you may stop at the Wayside (Hawthorne's house) and purchase one. The Wayside is next door to the Orchard House, across from the parking lot. The pass costs \$10 and is valid for life. The pass is good at National Parks and Monuments. You can then also tour the Wayside at no cost, using your pass.

By combining the two paint jobs, there is a cost savings as there is only the need to edge in the paint once. The cement siding will be painted to match the vinyl siding on the dormers, which will not be painted. In order for the painters to get to the lower siding and trim, some shrubs, trees, and plantings will have to be pruned.

Owners will need to take down anything hanging on the walls, the porch beams, or from the porch ceiling. You should remove any trellises, garden ornaments, or birdbaths. The painters will be instructed to avoid what they can, but there may be areas that can't be painted otherwise. We plan to give owners in each building at least 48 hours notice before the painters start on their area. De-

pending on the month they start and the weather, some of this may not be finished until next spring. We expect to have enough money set aside at this point that there will be no need for an assessment. We are not going to do the decks this year at all, but should be able to resume that cycle next year.

# **To My Cracked Friends**

An elderly Chinese woman had two large pots, each hung on the ends of a pole which she carried across her neck. 

## Microsoft Surface Family of **Tablets**

The announcement from Microsoft about its Surface family of tablets is very interesting. In it, Microsoft takes on industry leader Apple with its iPad and others such as Samsung.

Surface comes in two forms: an ARM-based, Windows RT-reliant version, and an Intel Core i5-based, full Windows 8 version.


The ARM version is aimed at novice users. It is a device that comes with a version of Windows that is restricted purely to the new Metro interface.

Metro, borrowed from Windows 8 and the Windows Phone platform, is designed for touch screens rather than keyboards. Instead of files and folders, there are touchable tiles that fire up your apps, and those apps take up the whole screen. it goes head-to-head with the iPad, and therefore suffers all the problems that any new entrant into the tablet market would expect. The lack of apps, momentum, and mobile data will probably prevent this Surface from making inroads into Apple's iPad hegemony.

But the Intel version is most certainly a horse of a different color. This version of Surface sits between ultrabooks and tablets. It comes packed with an architecture and chip that has more power than any of the ARM-based tablets thus far.

The real winner for business with this Surface is that it is running an instance of Windows 8 Professional, and will therefore have access to the classic desktop within Windows 8 to run the existing catalogue of Windows programs.

If you want apps, forget the various application stores. How does the entire Windows catalogue sound? These apps might not be pretty, optimized for a touch experience, or available for purchase with an iTunes card, but they are the same applications that users



You know that application built to work with Windows 95 that you have updated and carried into the future for the past 15 years? That's going to work on this tablet.

If people want an application to work on a mobile device, they can buy a tablet where the existing application works fine. It is a Windows 8 device that can be serviced using the same set of tools and skills that people already have.

The other bonus that Surface provides is its USB port. Want extra storage with an external drive? Need a full keyboard and mouse? It's no problem at all, and you don't have to visit an Apple Store to look for an adapter.

We expect that for home use a Surface will be plugged in to a large display and external keyboard. For mobile use, the built-in screen and keyboard will be used. It's powerful enough to field a proper operating system, small and light enough to be carried like a book, and has the customization and backwards compatibility that people are going to love.

Having a consistent interface on your phone, tablet, desktop and even TV and games machine with the Xbox, suddenly puts Microsoft back into the market as a major player after a long time without an answer to the mobility solutions on offer from Apple and Google.

The Microsoft Surface should be available around the end of the year.
