Lightly Spiced Sweet Potato Fries

Makes 4 servings Ingredients:

1 Tablespoon Oil

1 large sweet potato (about 1 I pound); peeling optional

1/4 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper


1 1/4 teaspoon Paprika

½ teaspoon Cinnamon

Directions:

- 1. Heat oven to 425°F.
- 2. Cut potato lengthwise into 1/2-inch-thick slices. Cut each slice lengthwise into 1/2-inch strips.
- 3. Arrange strips on baking sheet; drizzle oil over potatoes and toss with hands or spatula.
- 4. Combine salt, pepper, paprika and cinnamon in small cup; sprinkle half the mixture over strips. Bake 10 minutes, until lightly browned. Flip with spatula and sprinkle with remaining spice mixture. Bake 10 minutes more, until browned and tender.

Here we are in a brand new year, and based on the record performance of the market in 2013, most prognosticators are going out on a limb and looking to repeat or exceed that level in 2014. Many of the signs are there indicating that could be the case and we certainly hope the signs are pointing the right way.

First and foremost is the interest rates are still at or near historic lows. This is particularly encouraging for the first time home buyers who purchase the homes of the middle aged buyers who are moving into over 55 communities. And it appears that more of these middle aged buyers are looking to downsize into the active adult phase of their lives.

Secondly we find the banks have loosened up their purse strings a bit in the past year and are willing to

lend with fewer restrictions which enables the border line buyers greater access to mortgage monies.

Finally, we see the inventory is so low in our area that there are often multiple offers when a property is newly listed.

We renewed our Master Insurance policy with Arbella Insurance Group. The Board was pleasantly surprised to only see a 3% increase over last year's policy. This is significantly lower than the industry trend. Our new policy is \$76,186, while our budget projection was \$90,000. This leaves us with a \$13,815 budget surplus. The surplus will be used to help fund the following two non-budgeted items:

First, the generator turbocharger croaked and was replaced for a cost of \$2,289.60. The generator is used to supply power to the pump house in case of power failure.

Second, the number one 10 hp pump in the pump house is being replaced due to age and the need for a variable speed pump. This is critical since the current pump runs 24X7 and has already been rebuilt once. The cost of \$14,388 was approved by the Board. We will receive a rebate from the Hudson Light and Power Department; however, the specific amount is unknown at this time. Note: the pumps in the pump house provide the needed water pressure for Quail Run "mountain".

When the roofs were replaced one of the primary agenda items was to make attics colder in order to help eliminate ice dams and related damage. Now due to the extremely cold weather, some unit owners experienced frozen water pipes in the A unit upstairs bathrooms. There have also been a couple of issues with leaks into units. All repairs covered by our roof warranty have been addressed by SPS. Damage due to frozen pipes or vent hose condensation leaving water damage on bathroom ceilings, etc. are the unit owner's responsibility. The Board understands that this is a very "hard pill to swallow".

The Board and The Dartmouth Group have worked very closely with Dave's Landscaping on the snow plowing. We believe we have seen performance improvement.

The Board was asked by a unit owner to entertain setting up a priority snow removal process based on some folks needing to leave for work early. The Board dis-

cussed a ple unit times. Work at A.M., s several

cussed and had discussions with multiple unit owners regarding work leave times. At least one person leaves for work at 4:15 A.M., another at 4:45 A.M., someone else at 5:30 A.M., and several by 6:00 A.M.

Our best thoughts go to these early morning risers. After gathering this information and lacking any data on folks needing early medical treatment, the Board chose not to implement a priority snow removal process. Also it would cost us non-budgeted money.

The fall gutter cleaning was finished on January 15th. The proposal from SPS for deck repairs identified by the Building and Grounds Committee was approved. SPS will schedule once the weather is conducive to painting as some will be needed. The proposal from ValleyCrest to prune/clean the fence behind Strawberry and Rotherham was approved. ValleyCrest will complete this work as part of their spring clean-up.

The Community Center water damage repairs are complete. The men's bathroom was not painted as it was not part of the contract. The Board agreed that we need to look at having the men's bathroom painted; not something one could easily see when the baseboard trim was missing. Also, the dishwasher electrical wiring needed to bring it up to electrical code is complete.

The Board has received the revised Noblin reserve study. We are in the process of reviewing with the assistance of Dartmouth.

Per the *Community Advocate* (a local free newspaper many may not receive) the town of Hudson has contracted with Marlborough to continue to purchase water until December 2014. One of the two

wells shut down last summer is in the process of being brought back online. But in the meantime it's presumed our water bill will not decrease from the 30% increase of last year and we may again be facing a no watering ban. Also, the Board has made a number of visits to Hudson Water Department to dispute our water bills. The Water Department agrees that our bills are inaccurate and not in our favor. We are waiting for these to be recalculated and for the cause of the issue to be resolved. (Continued on page 10)



FIND AND REMOVE VIRUSES No matter how good | Free — Quite a few 3 ring your antivirus is, eventually it's going to miss something. There are all different kinds of "malicious software" or malware and each type infects your computer differently to achieve different goals. There are just too many threats out there for one program to handle.

MALWAREBYTES (http://www.malwarebytes.org/) This free powerful virus and spyware scanner can catch threats other software might miss. Since it doesn't run scans automatically, it won't conflict with your other antivirus programs. Run a scan with it at least once a month, or when you suspect that a virus has invaded your system. Before scanning, make sure to update the virus definitions from the Update tab otherwise, it won't detect the latest threats.


DRINKING WATER NOTICE

To all users of the Town Of Hudson Water Supply Division located in Hudson, Massachusetts.

On January 9, 2014, the Massachusetts Department of Environmental Protection conducted a site visit to the Kane Well. The town has connected the well, via a new water transmission line, to the Chestnut Street Water Filtration Plant. This well, out of service since September 2012 due to high levels of Manganese, has been approved for operations and will be returned to service on January 27, 2014.

Daily samples of finished water from the filtration plant will be taken by DPW personnel to assure compliance with the appropriate regulatory standards for Iron and Manganese in drinking water.

Weekly samples, during the first month, will be taken and sent to a state certified lab for compliance and

Area Highlights OLMSTEAD HOUSE

I have previously covered a visit to the grounds of The Frederick Law Olmstead National Historical Site. (March-April 2012)



After several years the improvements to the Olmstead home and design office have finally been completed and are now also open for touring. Forty-five minute ranger led tours are now offered several times throughout the week. This historic site houses both the home, design office and the grounds.

Fredrick Law Olmstead was the founder of American landscape architecture and park design. He was famous for designing Central Park in New York City, Mount Royal in Montreal, the oldest park at Niagara Falls and Boston's Emerald Necklace. He designed Arnold Arboretum and Jamaica Pond. He also designed the Chicago World's Fair (Read "The Devil in White City"). He designed Vanderbilt's Biltmore Estate in North Carolina. He even designed a city park in San Jose, California.

I have just returned from a visit there. His home is beautiful and the office is as he left it. Olmstead moved his home to this site in 1883 and established the world's first full-scale professional office for the practice of landscape design. In 1979 the 36 room house and office complex became a national historic site. For almost a century, his sons and successors perpetuated Olmstead's design ideals, philosophy, and influence.

Winter Hours are Friday and Saturday with tours at 10am, 11am, 1pm, 2pm, and 3pm. The grounds are open for self-guided tours 365 days a year from dawn to dusk. Grounds guides can be found by the visitor entrance.

The site is located at **99 Warren Street, Brookline**. From I-95 follow Rt. 9 for approximately 5 miles, through a major intersection with Lee Street and continue on 9, passing Brookline Reservoir on the right side. At the next intersection turn right onto Warren and follow 1/8 mile to Dudley. Olmstead NHS is on the right-hand corner. Or just use you GPS.

Bring it to the Second Repair Café on Saturday, 1 February from 9am—1 pm at Davis Hall at the First Parish of Bolton Church, 673 Main St., Bolton. Residents of surrounding towns are also invited to come and find out

what a Repair Café is all about.



At the Café, organized by Bolton Local, everything centers on making repairs. Knowledgeable volunteers will be available to help make all possible repairs on things like small appliances, computers, lamps, bikes, and clothing — free

of charge. There may be a cost for some small parts supplied. If they cannot repair it, they will offer suggestions about where to take it for repair, if repair is possible.



TECHNOLOGY FREE PROGRAMS TO PROTECT YOU FROM THE BAD GUYS

There are an endless number of threats in the digital world. Hackers, scammers, identity thieves and governments are after your information. Trying to keep your personal information secure sometimes can seem overwhelming, so that's why you need to start with the basics; strong, up-to-date security software to prevent theft of your bank passwords or account information.

FREE TOP RATED ANTIVIRUS PROGRAMS If you don't have anti-virus software, or your subscription has expired, here are three excellent free options available. You can also download full featured versions on a subscription basis.

<u>Warning:</u> if you already have an anti-virus program you're happy with, do not install another one. Anti-virus software will often not play well with one another, rendering one useless and the other less effective.

AVG AntiVirus (http://free.avg.com/us-en/download prd-afh line-2013) is consist

en/download.prd-afh.line-2013) is consistently one of the top-rated antivirus programs around. It often scores better than paid programs in security tests. It has real-time virus and spyware protection, along with powerful malware detection systems. An optional browser toolbar blocks ad-tracking and warns you about sites with low reputations. The major drawback is that it is geared toward more-advanced computer users.

Choose the link corresponding to your version of Windows (32 and 64-bit). When you install AVG, you'll see a screen during the process offering to install the AVG toolbar. This is a safe add-on for your Web browsers. It may help protect you against online threats, but it will change your browser settings. This toolbar is enabled by default, so if you don't want it you'll have to uncheck the boxes. If you click "Next" without paying attention to what you're doing, you could unwittingly change your browser settings. The installer will guide you through the process. Once installation is complete, allow AVG to update itself and then scan your computer. You should also schedule daily or weekly scans.

Avast! (http://www.avast.com/en-us/index) works on both PCs and Macs and is another top-rated free secu-

rity program. As with AVG, the free version blocks viruses and spyware automatically, and it has a good detection rate. The interface is more user-friendly, so this might be a better option for the casual user. Avast also has a free mobile security application for Android phones and tablets.

Microsoft Security Essentials

(www.microsoft.com/security essentials) for Windows XP and 7 protects against both viruses and spyware. It is easy to install and use. It downloads updated virus definitions almost daily, maintains a constant barrier against malware and can be scheduled to run weekly scans. Set it and forget about it. Windows Defender is built right into Windows 8 and requires no download or installation. Like Security Essentials it updates automatically and protects against both viruses and spyware.

MOBILE SECURITY Lookout Mobile Security can help keep your tablets and smartphones secure. It includes antivirus and anti-spyware protection, backs up your contact data and can help locate a missing or stolen smartphone. Download from play.google.com or ITunes.

<u>SPYWARE</u> Not all anti-virus programs protect against spyware. Spyware is like a virus, except it doesn't damage your computer, it merely hides and observes. Spyware can record and transmit your passwords, account numbers, keystrokes and more to a hacker. The following anti-spyware programs will not conflict with your antivirus software.

SPYWAREBLASTER.

(http://www.brightfort.com/spywareblaster.html) for Windows (32/64 bit) is an effective anti-spyware tool. Unlike most anti-spyware programs, it does not scan the hard drive for spyware, but instead prevents modifications to your files and settings. For example, it can block browser toolbars from installing themselves or prevent changes to critical Windows files.

SPYBOT - Search and Destroy (http://www.safer-networking.org/spybot2-own-mirror-1/) guards against spyware and adware without conflicting with other antivirus software. It can fix registry problems inflicted by spyware on your computer. It's regularly updated to deal with all the latest threats to your online privacy. Once the free program is downloaded, click *Start a Scan*. Once the scan is completed, you can clean temporary files, clear out malicious files and clean up your system just by clicking "Fix selected".

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
