HEALTHY LIVING

Alcohol, even in moderation, could harm your brain



The latest edition of the *Harvard Women's Health Watch*, September 2017, reported that even moderate drinking may not be good for your brain. Researchers from 2 universities in England found that imbibers, even those who met definitions for moderate drinking, saw higher rates of cognitive decline and brain shrinkage than their teetotaling counterparts. The study followed 550 men and women for 30 years, measuring their brain structure and function to determine how alcohol use affects the mind over time. What they found is that the more people drank, the more atrophy occurred in the brain's hippocampus, a seahorse-shaped structure in the brain that plays a role in storing memories. The highest risk was for people who drank 17 standard drinks or more of alcohol per week. But even people who drank moderately saw an elevated risk for cognitive changes. The study authors said the findings may raise questions about whether current US guidelines on alcohol consumption are appropriate.

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

Condo Care

After an extended power outage at my Condo, how do I know if the food in my freezer is safe to eat?

If you are away from home for a week or two and you lose power and gained it back, this is a good way to see if the food in your freezer is safe to eat.

Before you leave, place a small glass cup half filled with water in your freezer. Let the water freeze completely. Take it out and place a quarter on top of the frozen water and place the cup back into the freezer. When you return home, check the cup in the freezer. If the quarter is still at the top, no thawing took place. If the quarter is at the bottom of the cup, your freezer thawed food and then refroze the food. If this was the case, the entire contents of the freezer should be discarded, and contents of the refrigerator should be examined for any spoilage. When in doubt, throw it out.

The Equifax Breach: What You Should Know

The recent Equifax data breach is now considered the largest credit data breach in history. It affects almost half of the entire U.S. population. As in previous instances of data theft, those responsible for the theft of Social Security numbers and other data on as many as 143 million Americans from Equifax intend to sell this data to identity thieves.

Since you live in the U.S. and probably have a credit card(s), you are most likely affected. If ever there was a reminder that you are ultimately responsible for protecting your financial future, this is it. Here's what you need to know and what you should do in response to this unprecedented breach.

What is Equifax doing about this breach?

Information about the Equifax breach, can be found on the company's web site - www.equifaxsecurity2017.com. This includes a tool to tell you whether the company believes your data was accessed in the breach. Even if this tool indicates your data was spared, you can sign up for free credit monitoring for a year and Equifax will also waive any costs entailed in freezing your credit report, if you act within the next two months.

Note that this offer is from the same company that just had the worst credit data breach in history. And, since the information stolen is wide-ranging, is just one year of free credit monitoring enough? Often, stolen data doesn't show up for months down the road. In an earlier data breach, it was 18 months before company officials discovered the private information posted for sale on the Dark Web. It is possible that the

threat of identity theft for those affected in the Equifax breach could be lifelong.

Should I take advantage of the credit monitoring offer? It can't hurt, but don't count on it protecting you from identity theft. Credit monitoring does not prevent thieves from using your identity to open new lines of credit, and from damaging your good name for years to come in the process. The most you can hope for is that a credit monitoring service will alert you soon after an ID thief does steal your identity.

Credit monitoring services are principally useful in helping consumers recover from identity theft. Doing so often requires dozens of hours writing and mailing letters, and spending time on the phone contacting creditors and credit bureaus to straighten out the mess. In cases where identity theft leads to prosecution for crimes committed in your name by an ID thief, you may incur legal costs as well. Most of these services offer to reimburse you up to a specific amount for out-of-pocket expenses related to those efforts.

Prevent thieves from stealing your identity in the first place.

File a security freeze — also known as a credit freeze — with each of the four major credit bureaus. A security freeze essentially blocks any potential creditors from being able to view or “pull” your credit file, unless you affirmatively unfreeze or thaw your file beforehand. With a freeze in place on your credit file, ID thieves can apply for credit in your name all they want, but they will not succeed in getting new lines of credit in your name because few if any creditors will extend that credit without first being able to gauge how risky it is to loan to you (i.e., view your credit file). And because each credit inquiry caused by a creditor has the potential to lower your credit score, the freeze also helps protect your score, which is what most lenders use to decide whether to grant you credit when you truly do want it and apply for it.


Lesson Learned Tips You Should Keep In Mind

1. LONG - TERM PARKING:

Some people left their car in the long-term parking at San Jose while away, and someone broke into the car. Using the information on the car's registration in the glove compartment, they drove the car to the people's home in Pebble Beach and robbed it. So I guess if we are going to leave the car in long-term parking, we should NOT leave the registration/insurance cards in it, nor your remote garage door opener. This gives us something to think about with all our new electronic technology.

2. GPS:

Someone had their car broken into while they were at a football game. Their car was parked on the green which was adjacent to the football stadium and specially allotted to football fans. Things stolen from the car included a garage door remote control, some money and a GPS which had been prominently mounted on the dashboard. When the victims got home, they found that their house had been ransacked and just about everything worth anything had been stolen. The thieves had used the GPS to guide them to the house. They then used the garage remote control to open the garage door and gain entry to the house. The thieves knew the owners were at the football game, they knew what time the game was scheduled to finish and so they knew how much time they had to clean out the house. It would appear that they had brought a truck to empty the house of its contents. Something to consider if you have a GPS - don't put your home address in it. Put a nearby address (like a store or gas station) so you can still find your way home if you need to, but no one else would know where you live if your GPS were stolen.



3. CELL PHONES:

I never thought of this! This lady has now changed her habit of how she lists her names on her cell phone after her handbag was stolen. Her handbag, which contained her cell phone, credit card, wallet, etc., was stolen. Twenty minutes later when she called her hubby, from a pay phone telling him what had happened, hubby says, "I received your text asking about our Pin number and I've replied a little while ago." When they rushed down to the bank, the bank staff told them all the money was already withdrawn. The thief had actually used the

stolen cell phone to text "hubby" in the contact list and got hold of the pin number. Within 20 minutes he had withdrawn all the money from their bank account.



Moral lesson:

- A. Do not disclose the relationship between you and the people in your contact list. Avoid using names like Home, Honey, Hubby, Sweetheart, Dad, Mom, etc.
- B. And very importantly, when sensitive info is being asked through texts, CONFIRM by calling back.
- C. Also, when you're being texted by friends or family to meet them somewhere, be sure to call back to confirm that the message came from them. If you don't reach them, be very careful about going places to meet "family and friends" who text you.

4. PURSE IN THE GROCERY CART SCAM:



A lady went grocery-shopping at a local mall and left her purse sitting in the children's seat of the cart while she reached something off a shelf. Wait till you read the WHOLE story! Her wallet was stolen, and she reported it to the store personnel. After returning home, she received a

phone call from the Mall Security to say that they had her wallet and that although there was no money in it, it did still hold her personal papers. She immediately went to pick up her wallet, only to be told by Mall Security that they had not called her. By the time she returned home again, her house had been broken into and burglarized. The thieves knew that by calling and saying they were Mall Security, they could lure her out of her house long enough for them to burglarize it.

September Board of Governors (BOG) News



Welcome to fall. How the time does fly.

First, thanks to all unit owners for watering the new trees and arborvitae! Some of the trees especially in the open area on Rotherham have been “loved too much” but should be okay. As long as our trees and arborvitae are well watered they are under a one year warranty.



The past two months have again been busy.

- Twenty-two residents attended the AED classes. Thanks to everyone who attended!
- A motor saver was installed by Hayes Pump on the number one pump at the pump house during their previous preventive maintenance inspection.
- An auto dialer has been installed on the “mission pump” at the pump house. If our pumps have loss of pressure or all four pumps are running which should never occur unless there is an issue, Warren Security will be sent a message so they may contact Hayes Pump. A message will also be sent to The Dartmouth Group and two Board members for immediate response to the issue. A couple of issues have occurred during the past couple of years. The latest issue occurred approximately six weeks ago when a Board member discovered that all four pumps were running and an emergency repair was made.
- The unit owners at 5D Autumn had an issue with loss of power at the unit’s main power breaker. These breakers are located on the electrical panels behind the arborvitae and not inside the units. All unit main power breakers have been inspected and found to be okay. The main power breaker for 5D Autumn has to be replaced with a 125 AMP breaker. The electrician who made the emergency repair used a 100 AMP breaker which does not meet the code requirements.
- Shrubs and perennials growing against the wood trim have been removed or pruned. At least 18 inches was determined to be necessary for anything growing against the wood trim and gas meters. Shrubs were pruned to the bottom of the kitchen windows, or if in a C unit the bedroom window, or to the top of the porch

railing. The Board does appreciate how painful this was to unit owners. However, with the number of units experiencing wood rot on the trim this was absolutely necessary. During this project flower beds were also cleaned and low growing limbs on trees were removed.



- Scott Forbes, our general contractor, has completed most of the items on the rotted wood list. A final punch list has been prepared and sent to Scott. The list does include the “worst of the worst” shingles that need to be replaced this year. The repairs to date have cost the Association close to twenty thousand dollars. Any major shingle replacement has been postponed until next year due to budget constraints.
- Multiple dryer vent covers have been replaced. Many water spigots have been replaced. If you have a dryer vent cover that still needs to be replaced or a leaking spigot please contact Jen Bouley of The Dartmouth Group at (781) 533-7208.
- The hillside between 11 Autumn and 2 Strawberry has been split seeded. Compost was put down following the reseeding. As part of this project, it was discovered there were three buried sprinkler heads. They have been fixed. With irrigation this hillside should look great in the spring.
- Dave’s Landscaping continues to monitor our irrigation system and makes repairs as needed.
- Dave’s Landscaping is in the process of repairing and sealing our gutters. Unfortunately the brackets for our gutters are commercial grade and replacement parts had to be sourced through Amazon. This project will be completed soon. They will also be cleaning the gutters this fall.



September Board of Governors (BOG) News



- The Board has contracted with Eagle Painting to stain the replaced wood on decks. This project should start soon. Eagle Painting has also been contracted to paint the wood trim that has rust. This part of the project will not happen until spring.

New signage has been installed on the road in hopes of having folks drive slower. We do have folks who walk and some after dark with dogs.

The Board met with New England Seal Coating. We are looking at the potential of seal coating our road and driveways. The cost is approximately \$40,000. During our due diligence, we looked at two other condominium communities that have been seal coated. Overall the results are:

- The surface of the roads will have less traction during inclement conditions, but not to folks walking.
- All snow removal equipment must be equipped with a special blade or the surface will be ripped up. That means no extra snow removal trucks could be used during extremely bad conditions.
- Once seal coated the crack sealing will still be visible. The seal coating on surfaces where there is traffic will fade within two years, give or take.
- Once our roadways are seal coated we must repeatedly seal coat the roads every two years or so. That is again another \$40,000 or so.
- We would still need to crack seal the roadways and driveways every two to three years. Seal coating does not extend the life of the roads. Crack sealing extends the life of roads and driveways.
- The Board was told by New England Seal Coating that we have at least another ten years or so for our roads and driveways as long as we continue to crack seal them.

The Board is obtaining a list of other locations to look at before a final decision on this subject is made.

The backflow preventers at 1G and 2F Rotherham will be lowered this fiscal year. There are other backflow preventers that are very high in the front of units. These will be addressed next year.

The front porch project remains unfinished. Majestic Painting has also not been paid nor submitted an invoice! We have not heard from them. We do have a punch list of unfinished items. We are asking Eagle Painting to give us a quote to finish this project based on our list.

Our trash and recycle contract with Republic Services is up for renewal this fall. The Board and The Dartmouth Group are seeking bids from other rubbish removal companies as well as Republic Services. We will do our best in securing a new contract at a reasonable cost. As a side note, our previous rubbish removal company is no longer in business.

As a resident at The Villages of Quail Run it is expected that you have read and understand the Rules and Regulations. They may also be found on the Quail Run web site. Again do read and understand what is included. The Board has again addressed a couple of issues during the past two months.

It has been mentioned in previous *Quail Runner* newsletters that unit owner's changing locks need to have them rekeyed to the master key. There is a unit where locks were changed by a previous owner and not rekeyed. The previous owner had an issue and the emergency response team gained access through the kitchen windows. The locks on the kitchen windows were broken and now the new unit owner has to address this issue. The emergency response team does have a master key.

Think this is critical.


