



TECHNOLOGY JARGON

Bluetooth: another form of wireless technology. It is a standard for exchanging data over short distances and replaces computer cables.

Bookmarks/Favorites: a link to the Web site addresses saved electronically in a browser (Internet Explorer, Chrome, Safari, Netscape) to help you gain quick access to the Web page you visit on a regular basis.

CD-RW, CD-R, DVD-R, DVD+R: refer to special disk drives that can record CD and DVD disks rather than merely playing them back. CD-RWs (RW is short for re-writeable) are disks on which you can repeatedly record data or music. CD-Rs, which can be written on only once, but are cheaper. The drives that handle both of these disks are called CD-RW drives.

Cache: computer memory with very short access time used for storage of frequently or recently used instructions or data. Temporary storage of web documents.

Cookie: small piece of data sent from a website and stored in a user's web browser while a user is browsing a website. When the user browses the same website in the future, the data stored in the cookie can be retrieved by the website to notify the website of the user's previous activity.

Dongle: small device that plugs into a computer and serves as an adapter.

Ethernet: a system for connecting a number of computer systems to form a local area network with protocols to control the passing of information.

Firewire: external connector, similar to a USB port, that provides a high-speed connection between a computer and peripheral devices.

Flat screen monitors: a type of video display that is thin and flat, commonly used in laptops and televisions.

HTTP (HyperText Transfer Protocol): it is the underlying protocol used by the World Wide Web to define how messages are formatted and transmitted.

IP Address: an Internet Protocol address (IP address) is a set of numbers separated by periods that is assigned to each device on a specific computer network. It provides identification on that network. If it changes networks (for instance, go to another house) it receives a new IP address.

JPEG (Joint Photographic Experts Group): standard algorithm for the compression of digital images; a digital image stored as a file.

LAN (Local Area Network): is a computer network that interconnects computers in a limited area such as a home, school, computer laboratory, or office building using network media.

NIC: a network interface card, network adapter, or LAN adapter that connects a computer to a computer network. Every device has to have a network adapter.

PC: (Personal Computer): can be a Macintosh Computer or a Windows based computer.

PC Suite: a package of Windows-based PC applications such as Microsoft Office or iWorks.

RAM (Random Access Memory): computer memory that hold the data you are working on at any one moment. Every PC, tablet and smartphone has this feature.

ROM (Read Only Memory): computer memory that can permanently store data and applications within it.

Shared video memory: main memory is shared by the display functions. Sharing main memory with the display function reduces the amount of memory available to applications. Main memory is not as fast as the specialized video memory on stand-alone video cards. Traditionally, PCs used a special bank of memory for the video circuitry. Lately, however, cheaper PCs are stealing a portion of main memory for use with their video circuitry. This can impair performance by degrading the amount of main memory the computer can use.

(Technology Corner con't)

TCP/IP: (Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol (TCP/IP)): is the suite of communications protocols used to connect hosts on the Internet.

Thunderbolt: a standard type of connection that might be used for external peripherals to a computer. Thunderbolt is considered a potential replacement for USB, FireWire, PCIe, SCSI, SATA, and other forms of data transfer methods.

USB (Universal Serial Bus): most widely used hardware interface for attaching peripherals such as smartphones, flash drives, cameras, and printers to a computer.

USB 3.0: the third major version of the USB standard for interfacing computers and electronic devices. Among other improvements, USB 3.0 adds the new transfer rate referred to as *SuperSpeed USB* (SS) that can transfer data at up to 5 Gbit/s (625 MB/s), which is about ten times as fast as the USB 2.0 standard.

WAP (Wireless Application Protocol): a technical standard for accessing information over a mobile wireless network. A WAP browser is a web browser for mobile devices such as mobile phones that uses the protocol. It allows users to access information instantly via handheld wireless devices such as mobile phones, pagers, two-way radios, smartphones and communicators.

Web browser: commonly referred to as a browser is a software application for retrieving, presenting and traversing information resources on the World Wide Web. Examples are Internet Explorer, Safari, Chrome, Netscape, and Opera.

Wi-Fi (Wireless Fidelity): also known as 802.11b, 802.11g, 802.11n, creates a wireless network that allows multiple users to share the same Internet connection in small areas like homes and some offices.

November Board of Governors (BOG) News



By now you have received the 2018 budget. Good news, there will be no increase to the condominium fees in 2018. The Board looks forward to seeing everyone at the Annual Budget Meeting on December 12th at the Community Center at 7:00 PM.

Thanks again to all unit owners for their dedication in watering the new trees and arborvitae! A great job was performed by all. The Board has been monitoring our trees and there are a few more that appear to be failing. We will keep a watch on the trees and address as needed next year.

The Hudson Water Department flushed the fire hydrants for the first time in several years. There was no cost to us for this service.

The auto dialer installed on the "mission pump" at the pump house has paid for itself. There was an issue following the fire hydrant flushing where all four pumps were working and the generator started up. Folks received calls and the problem was quickly resolved. If the auto dialer was not present, who knows how long it would have taken to know we had an issue.

In case anyone is confused, the Board and The Dartmouth Group are maintaining four separate work lists. One for painting the raw wood on decks, one for replacement of rotted wood and shingles, one for rust stains and clear sealing new shingles, and one for the remaining front porch project. You may have seen workers but have not had your particular issue addressed. Hopefully we have you on one of the lists.

Scott Forbes, our general contractor, has completed all rotted wood items on the list through November 14 th. However; on November 14th it was discovered that there are two more decks that need some additional repair. Also, woodpeckers are damaging the shingles at 2A and 6G Rotherham. In close inspection Scott found several units with deteriorated roof stack pipe boots. Scott has already replaced the roof stack pipe boots on all units at 11 Autumn Drive. The rest of these items will be addressed as quickly as possible.

The Board signed a contract with Eagle Painting and Wallpaper to do our painting projects. Eagle Painting

stained all the raw deck wood on the list. In fact at the time they checked every deck for missing stain. However, since that occurred additional deck repairs have been made and will be stained in the spring. They have also seal coated the new shingles but not those replaced since the weather turned cold. They have been sealing and painting the trim rust spots. They finished the work on all identified units on Autumn. The Board feels that Eagle Painting is doing quality work. What they do, they do right, and always show up when scheduled.

So, bottom line, the porch project punch list is still open, some deck railings still need to be stained, additional new shingles need to be clear coated and the rest of the rusted trim needs to be sealed and painted. This all has to wait until the temperatures warm up.

We have to replace two inside pressure reducers due to high pressure reading for the buildings. A third one has already been replaced. Too much pressure can cause damage to washer hoses and other water lines. These two pressure reducers are on order and will be replaced as soon as they are received.

The irrigation system has been shut down for the winter. The lawns were aerated and fertilized. Snow stakes have been installed. Fall cleanup and gutter cleaning will start as soon as the rest of the leaves on the oak and pear trees are down. Due to extra warm fall temperatures this is delayed.

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November Board of Governors (BOG) News

The Board met with Dave's Landscaping to discuss this coming winter snow

cleanup. Two snow blowers plus shovels will be stored in the shed. The snow blowers will be used when appropriate to more quickly remove snow from the front of porches and around garage doors. It was suggested that if you have a vehicle in the driveway, you clean it up enough to back it up and clean the rest of the snow off the vehicle into the circle or street. Dave's will then clean up the rest of the circle or street providing they are still working on-site. A liquid pretreatment deicer will be used this year. It will be put down before the snow starts. This is to help with easier and quicker snow removal and is similar to the pretreatment that the state uses on the main highways. As always, the property will be cleaned up as quickly as possible. It was suggested by Dave's that we give him a list of folks who leave during the winter months. This will help in the timeliness of the cleanup process for on-site folks. They will mark the stakes of vacant units and clean those driveways last. So, if you plan to leave during the winter months and no one is using your driveway, please let Jen Bouley at

jbouley@thedartmouthgroup.com know when you will be gone and coming back so a list can be made.

The Board decided to replace the trash and recycle company. This was due to ongoing significant issues with Republic Services. We have chosen to go with a private firm, Colonial Waste (DBA Mr. Trashman). You should have received a notice from The Dartmouth Group via email or hard copy by the time this newsletter is published. Also, please reference the separate article in this *Quail Runner* newsletter for the details. One of the new exclusions is yard waste. Per the Massachusetts "Solid Waste" guidelines yard waste is not to be included in the trash as it is decomposable and should not go into a land fill. The Board is discussing alternate yard waste disposal arrangements.

The Board suggests that unit owners/residents periodically check their basements and lofts for water. Along with some leakage on the main water pipes in two host units, a couple of other unit owners have experienced an issue with the shower drain seal deteriorating and leaking into the basement, and if your water heater has not been replaced, there may be some leakage due to age.

Also, there are two recent units with water infiltration into the loft area due to deterioration of roof stack pipe boots

You should have received a notice from The Dartmouth Group by the time that this newsletter is published. The Republic Services totes (e.g., barrels) are to be left on the street following the November 30th trash pickup. They will be picked up by Republic Services on December 1st. Mr. Trashman will be delivering new totes on December 2nd. Their first pickup date is Tuesday, December 5th. The totes/barrels need to be out by 8:00 AM.
