

HEALTHY LIVING

Is it a common cold or the flu?

Most people with the flu have mild illness and do not need medical care or antiviral drugs. If you get sick with flu symptoms, in most cases, you should stay home and avoid contact with other people except to get medical care. Flu symptoms usually begin abruptly and are more likely to include fever, chills, very achy muscles and headache. These symptoms are less common with a cold. If you suspect you have the flu, and in a high-risk group (like have a chronic disease and are older) pay a visit to your doctor as soon as possible so he or she can determine if you might be a candidate for an antiviral medication.

In October 2018 for the first time in 20 years, the FDA approved a new medication to treat the flu. The new medicine is sold as Xofluza, not a vaccine but rather an antiviral drug that can help your body fight off influenza more quickly according to Dr. Ricciotti and Dr. Golen in the *Harvard Health Watch*, February 2019. Xofluza joins two antiviral drugs commonly prescribed for flu, Tamiflu and Relenza. Like Tamiflu, Xofluza is taken orally, and it should be started within two days of when your first flu symptoms appear. Unlike the other antiviral drugs, however, Xofluza requires just one dose, not multiple doses taken for several days. It is approved to be used only in people ages 12 and older. It is also likely to be more expensive than the established flu drugs.

Different antiviral medications produce different side effects. Common ones include diarrhea, nausea, and vomiting. It should be noted that antiviral medications like Xofluza are not a substitute for the flu vaccine. Vaccination and keeping your hands clean are still recommended as the best ways to prevent the flu.

Be sure to cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Throw the tissue in the trash after you use it. Wash your hands often with soap and water.



Condo Car**e**

Our dishwasher is starting to show its age. I have noticed the racks inside are showing rust spots. To prolong the racks from rusting out completely, Hudson Appliance has a product called Dishwasher Rackcote. It is a small bottle of thick liquid material that you would apply to the rust spots on vinyl coated dishwasher racks, and it comes with an applicator. Just apply the liquid material to the rust spots and let dry for 24 hours before turning on the dishwasher. This material will prevent the rust from getting worse. The cost is about \$8.00 a bottle.

January Board of Governors (BOG) News



Thanks to everyone who attended the Annual Budget Meeting. A copy of the presentation document was emailed to all residents with an email address in case folks were unable to attend the meeting.

As indicated during the meeting, we will be replacing our deck railings and spindles with PVC over a three year period. This project will commence in the Spring. This will result in a budget amendment of approximately \$3,000.00 per unit owner. The options for paying the budget amendment are to pay the total fee up front or to pay once a year over three years. The Board is in the process of obtaining three bids for this project. More details will follow once all bids are received and a contractor is selected. During this three year project all decks will be made safe for residents.

The 2019 Master Insurance policy has been signed with an effective date of January 26, 2019. It reflects a 12% increase over last year due to the insurance claim for repairs to the pump house and a personal injury claim. In reviewing the policy the Board voted to increase the deductible from \$10,000 to \$25,000 for a savings of \$6,485. Further information will be forthcoming from The Dartmouth Group. It will include a letter stating the coverage for 2019 for unit owner to give to their insurance agents. All unit owners need to contact their insurance agents to make sure the change in the deductible is appropriately covered by their unit owner policies.

It has been determined by J&J&Son Landscaping that there are four outside irrigation water shut off valves leaking which need repair in the Spring. This will require access to the basements of those four units.

Competitive bids are being obtained to move the entrance sign on Rotherham Way to the pump house side of the road. This will permit lighting of the sign.

Unit owners/residents continue to violate the Rules and Regulations. It is expected that all unit owners/residents have read and understand the Rules and Regulations. If you don't have a copy of the document it may be found on the Quail Run web site under the Governance tab. Failure to follow the Rules and Regulations will result in unit owner fines.

It is the unit owner's responsibility to clear the snow from the gas and dryer vents as well as gas meters.

Don't drive beyond the property posted speed limits!

Hopefully everyone will have a healthy and happy 2019.



Technology Corner By Peter Recklet



Phishing Emails Are More Dangerous Than Ever

Crooks who try to trick you into giving up your private information or install malware have been around for as long as we've been online. Years ago, phishing emails were much easier to spot. Criminals and scam artists were more careless and would send messages full of typos and bad grammar. And although these scams should be easy to spot by now, scammers are constantly working to make those emails, along with fake web sites they link to, look completely legitimate. Most phishing emails usually have some type of clue or "tell" that gives away the fact it's a scam. Do you think you can spot a real email from a fake?

Google's Jigsaw has a new quiz to test just how much you know about all the ways scammers will try to trick you. And even for someone who knows what to look for, it's still not a very easy quiz. Some are examples of an innocent email, while others have all been inspired by real phishing emails that Google has come across. This quiz will not only tell you if you were right or wrong, but it'll also point out the details you can use to spot phishing emails in the future. Some of these details are so subtle, that they're very easy to miss. Take this new quiz at

https://phishingquiz.withgoogle.com/

Today, criminals are using sophisticated tools to create messages and websites that look legitimate. You might receive an email that contains a company logo and flawless text that seems authentic.

Here is a clever trick used in phishing emails that make them nearly impossible to spot. We've always been advised to check the URL (Uniform Resource Locator or web address). That means before clicking a link or a button on a website or in an email, you hover your cursor over it to see the URL that it's actually going to send you to. Unfortunately, that advice is no longer entirely foolproof.

Scammers have discovered a way to imitate or spoof a website's URL by making one little change that you might not notice. It may appear that the web address is spelled correctly, however, a closer examination will

reveal that instead of using all the proper letters they've replaced at least one that includes an accent mark.

For example, take the web site for Citizens Bank (www.citizensbank.com). Instead of using a typical lower-case e like you find in the word citizens, a scammer could replace it with an é. Do you see the little accent mark on top of the e? You can do this on your own computer. Just hold down the Alt key while typing 0233. You are using an Alt code and the technical term for this result is "e acute".

So instead of going to the official Citizens Bank home page, you could be clicking on a link to the Citizens Bank page. Would you even notice? There are many more Alt codes for other letters, and they can be used to spoof any website out there.

What are some things we can do to protect ourselves from a phishing attack? First, be very cautious about links. Do not click on web links in unsolicited email messages. If you need to communicate with a company, never trust a link that's inside a message. It's always best to type its web address directly into your browser. If you receive an email that requests personal information from a company that you do business with on a regular basis, pick up the phone and call them.

Second, always use unique passwords. It's convenient to use the same password for multiple websites, but it can be a terrible mistake. If your credentials are stolen from one site and you use the same username and/or password on others, it's easy for the cybercriminal to get into each account.

BOG News: Snow Storm January 19th Thru 20th and Cleanup



On January 23rd the Board and The Dartmouth Group had a debriefing meeting with Justin, Mike and Mark from J&J&Son Landscaping to discuss the cleanup of the January 19th and 20th Winter storm.

The Landscaping company was back on site on January 23rd doing additional cleanup.

First, didn't realize we got 11 inches of snow before it turned to sleet and then freezing rain. Also, didn't realize that once the sleet started to come down the temperatures plummeted immediately causing everything to freeze. This was an extremely difficult storm to clean up. J&J&Son Landscaping indicated they have monitoring equipment used to determine the conditions by location and could tell us the situation they were dealing with. The Quail Run roads and circles were pre-treated which doesn't work with ice. The bobcat with the snow blower couldn't be used because of the ice. Several driveways and circle roads were not cleaned up to our expectations.

Second, J&J&Son Landscaping admitted they could have done things better and will make appropriate adjustments in the future.

J&J&Son Landscaping will adopt the method used by our previous snow removal company. The first goal as always is to keep the main road open followed by the circle roads. This is for access by emergency vehicles. They will start cleanup of driveways, mailbox kiosks, fire hydrants, paths to the pump house, and fire kiosk, etc. on Rotherham for one storm event and then switch starting on Autumn for the next storm event. There will be no jumping around except in cases of emergency (e.g., a medical emergency, someone stuck in their driveway and needs help, or someone needing to go to work and can't get out, etc.) The last to be addressed will be the satellite parking areas. As need be the satellite parking areas may be cleaned a day following a storm. This is of course if it's above zero with the wind

index chill factor.

The Board and The Dartmouth Group will work closely with J&J&Son Landscaping as our Winter season progresses.
