

Dinner Hour and Stroke Risk

Did you know that people who wait an hour or more after eating before going to bed have a 66% lower stroke risk? Well, according to a study out of Europe that is true and for every 20 minutes more that you wait, stroke risk drops another 10% says researcher Cristina-Maria Kastorini, MSC, a nutritionist at the University of Ioannina Medical School in Greece. According to an article in WebMD, results of the study were presented at the European Society of Cardiology Congress. Compared with people who went to bed within an hour of dinner, those who waited 60 to 70 minutes to two hours had a 76% lower likelihood of having a stroke. After two hours, the reduction in risk started to taper off, for reasons as yet unexplained.

The study analysis took into account a host of heart disease and stroke risk factors such as age, sex, physical activity, weight, smoking, diet, family history of heart disease, high blood pressure, high cholesterol levels and diabetes.

The study included 500 healthy people; 250 people who had had a stroke and 250 with acute coronary syndrome. Acute coronary syndrome is a common type of heart disease where typically there is reduced blood flow to the heart because of clogged arteries, which can lead to tightness in the chest and even a heart attack.

So maybe your mother was right when she told you not to eat just before going to bed!

Do you need a REAL ID Massachusetts Driver's License/ID Card?

Please go to the "Massachusetts Real ID" website page at (www.mass.gov/REALID) for important information you need in order to get a REAL ID Massachusetts Driver's License Card.

Everyone needs to be aware that this is going to be crucial if one wants to fly in the US, or to enter any federal building after 1/1/2021. There are certain documents required when you apply to get this type of Massachusetts Driver's License/ID card:

- 1. One (1) Social Security Number Document (SSN) card, or a W-2 Form)*
- 2. One (1) Lawful Presence/Date of Birth Document -(US Passport, or a Certified Copy of your Birth Certificate, or SSA-1099 Form)*
- 3. Two (2) Proof of Massachusetts Residency Documents - (Property Tax Form, or Lease, or Mortgage)*
- * Please refer to the website as there are additional proof forms that may be used, than are listed above. Be aware that all documents must be original, photocopies will not be accepted.

POISON

WARNING - PLEASE WASH THOSE CANS!

A woman went boating one Sunday taking with her some cans of coke which she put into the refrigerator of the boat. On Monday she was taken to the hospital and placed in the Intensive Care Unit and passed away on Wednesday.

An autopsy concluded she died of **Leptospirosis**. This was traced to the can of coke she drank from, and not using a glass. Tests showed that the coke can top was infected by dried rat urine and hence the disease Leptospirosis.

Rat urine contains toxic and deathly substances. It is highly recommended to thoroughly wash the upper part of **all cans or containers** before drinking out of them or opening the cans to consume the food inside. All canned goods are typically stocked in warehouses and transported straight to the shops without being cleaned.

A study at NYCU has showed that the tops of all cans are usually contaminated (i.e.).. with germs and/or some type of bacteria. So wash these items with water before putting them to your mouth or opening them for feeding your family. This will help you avoid any kind of fatal food poisoning that may be on the top of the cans or drink/food containers.

Please remember to wash all fruits and vegetables before eating them!



Ultra Sonic Rodent Repellent Devices

For those of you who may want to either get rid of, or deter mice from entering your unit, there are Ultra Sonic Rodent Repellent devices available to accomplish this.

These devices can be purchased at Lowes, Home Depot or Amazon. They are electronic devices that plug into a wall outlet. These devices send a high frequency noise that critters can't stand. The noise can not be heard by humans (but may bother hamsters or some dogs).

There are many different types and price ranges. I have used a device that costs about \$30.00 and covered about 300 sq. ft. The sonic frequency does not go around corners or through walls, so if you have more than one room or a large open area where you need this device, you may need to purchase multiple devices. They do come pre-packaged in multipacks.



July Board of Governors (BOG) News

Welcome to Summer. Let's hope the high temperatures that we had in the middle of July are no indication of what's to come for the rest of the Summer.

By the time this is published you should have received a hard copy of the Amended Rules and Regulations. Please read carefully as changes have been made throughout the document to bring it into alignment with the Master Deed. One item that was changed to conform with the Master Deed, was the weight of dogs (i.e., from 35 pounds to 30 pounds). Please rest assured, the Board has no intentions of checking to see if the current dogs meet this requirement.

The deck railing project for the first 50 units is in progress. The unit owners whose decks have been or will be retrofitted in 2019, were notified. As of the writing of this document, the decks at 7 and 12 Strawberry are complete. Scott Forbes is working on 1 Autumn.

Per prior communication, unit owners were given the option of paying for the budget amendment in total by September 1st, 2019, or monthly at \$82.00 per month for three years effective September 1st of 2019. If as a unit owner you choose to pay monthly, the final payment would be \$60.00 as the \$82.00 is a rounded-up figure. As indicated previously, the Board chose not to finance the deck railing project through a bank loan. That would have increased the cost of the project. As each phase of the project is complete the contractor must be paid. If only the units in phase one were asked to make payments, there would not be enough money to pay the contractor without passing on the total amount of the budget amendment to those unit owners and not giving them the option to make monthly payments. The same would be true for the second and third phases of the project. To be equitable, the cost has been spread over the life of the project and the amount due is the same for all unit owners. Also, the option for paying for this project at \$1,000 per year for three years was tabled due to the accounting nightmare this would create.

Mark Campbell and Mike Veseskis of J&J&Son have repaired all irrigation issues. All rain sensors were replaced. The sensor will shut down the irrigation system when there is ¼ inch of water in the sensor. Lawns were fertilized on July 15th. All shrubs were pruned and/or removed as needed on July 17th. The mower heads have been set to four inches due to grass burning. NO ONE IS TO TOUCH THE OUTSIDE IRRIGATION BACKFLOWS OR THE IRRIGATION HEADS. If, as a unit owner, you detect an issue please contact Jen Bouley at jbouley@thedartmouthgroup.com.

The Board has approved a bid to plant shrubbery around the relocated Village of Quail Run sign on Rotherham.

Big kudos and 'at-a-boys' go to:

- The Social Committee for putting flags around the front planting areas on Autumn and Rotherham for every appropriate day to honor our veterans.
- Sally Mauro and Barbara Baker for working for several days to organize the Community Center storage room.
- Dick DiBuono and Bill McPhail for cutting all low branches on the street trees. They will also be cutting low branches on trees in the circles imminently.

During the July 4th holidays the air conditioner compressor on the Community Center burned out and the starter capacitor failed. It required repair quickly as there was a private rental scheduled on Sunday. We had it repaired on Friday which was a holiday for Chaves Air Conditioning and were billed time and a half for the labor. The technician doing the repairs pointed out several issues with the air conditioner. He indicated that we need to replace it within the not too distant future. In the meantime, the Board has received and approved a maintenance contract for the Community Center air conditioner from Middlesex Cooling and Heating.

Gutters will be cleaned within the next week or so.

When To Use Reply, Reply All, and Forward when using Email

Does it bother you to receive an email and see multiple email addresses that have nothing to do with you? That is because someone in the group clicked on Reply All instead of Reply. Are you thrilled when you just see the name of the group?

If you are one of these offenders who doesn't pay attention to where your replies/responses are being sent, it generally means you have allowed your mouse to hover over the Reply All for more than 30 seconds or you have not paid attention to what is popping up in the Mail program.

Below are a couple of examples of when to use Reply versus Reply All.

Reply is when your email goes to a single person. This is usually the person who sent the original email.

Reply All is when your response goes to everyone in the thread. If you use Reply All, every person who received the original email will see your reply.

You should ask yourself some questions before deciding between Reply and Reply All.

Is the email addressed to me?

If so, who has to know my answer?

Does everyone in the thread need to know my answer or only the person who originated the email?

If I don't use Reply All, will other members of the group be concerned if they don't see my reply?

If an email is addressed to you but only one person needs to know your response, use Reply.

If your response will impact multiple people, use Reply All.

If you are on an email chain where it is important to know what all the participants are doing, you might want to use Reply All. That way, if someone who responds in the affirmative doesn't show up, the group can check if that person is okay.

An example of when you should use Reply is when your response is about purchasing tickets for an event. The only person who needs to know if you are going to participate is the person buying the tickets. So if you want to go to that baseball game, use Reply.

Please spare the members of a group from having to read emails that are not pertinent to everyone in the thread.

So what is **Forward**? It is simply a way of forwarding/sending an email you received, to another person or multiple people.

FOR SAFETY SAKE! Safety Tips Written by a Policeman

- 1. If a robber asks for your wallet and/or purse,...... DO NOT HAND IT TO THEM. Toss it away from you. Chances are that they are more interested in your wallet and/or purse than you, and they will go for the wallet/purse, AND RUN AND SCREAM LIKE MAD IN THE OTHER DIRECTION!
- 2. If you are ever thrown into the trunk of a car, kick out the back tail lights and stick your arm out the hole and start waving like crazy. The driver won't see you, but everybody else will. This has saved lives.

3. People have a tendency to get into their cars after shopping, eating, working, etc., and just sit (doing their checkbook, or making a list, talking on the phone, etc.)... DON'T DO THIS! AS SOON AS YOU GET INTO YOUR CAR, LOCK THE DOORS, PUT ON YOUR SEAT BELT AND LEAVE.

If someone is in the backseat of your car and starts to threaten you, DO NOT DRIVE OFF!
Instead gun the engine and speed into anything, damaging the car. Since you already have your seat belt on, your Air Bag will save you. If the person is in the back seat, they will not be prepared for a crash, will not have their seat belt on, and will get the worst outcome of the unexpected crash.

As soon as the car crashes and stops......BAIL OUT, SCREAM FOR HELP AND RUN!!!!

- 4. A few notes about getting into your car in a parking lot, or parking garage:
- BE AWARE... look around you, look into your car, at the passenger side floor and in the back seat.
- If you are parked next to a big van, enter your car from the passenger door. You do not want to be pulled into a van while you are attempting to get into the car.
- Look at the car parked on the driver's side of your vehicle, and the passenger side. If anyone is sitting alone in the seat near your car, walk back into the mall, or work, and get a guard/policeman to walk you back out. It's always better to be safe than sorry.
- 5. Always take the elevator instead of the stairs. Stairwells are horrible places to be alone and the perfect crime spot.
- 6. Water scam! If you wake up in the middle of the night to hear all your taps outside running or what you think is a burst pipe..... DO NOT GO OUT TO INVESTIGATE! This may put you in danger.

Bad people or thieves have been known to turn on all outside water taps so that the homeowner will go out to investigate and then may attack the homeowner. Stay inside the house and call *911 and wait for them to investigate*. Stay alert, keep safe, and look out for your neighbors!
