Comparing the COVID-19 Vaccines



Currently, there are three vaccines developed by Pfizer, Moderna, and Johnson & Johnson for emergency approval to be given to adults 18 and older (Moderna and J & J), and age 16 and older (Pfizer).

Individuals are unlikely to be offered a choice of which vaccine they want. The vaccine available at the place where you are being vaccinated is the one you'll likely get.

Pfizer and Moderna vaccines are made using messenger RNA (mRNA), a technology that delivers a bit of genetic code to cells, in effect a recipe to make the surface protein (known as a spike) on the SARS-2 virus. These proteins made with the mRNA instructions, activate the immune system, teaching it to see the spike protein as foreign and develop antibodies and other immunity weapons with which to fight it. The J & J vaccine uses a different approach to instruct human cells to make the SARS-2 protein, which then triggers an immune response.

The Pfizer and Moderna vaccines have shown astonishing degrees of efficacy - Pfizer vaccine showed 95% efficacy at preventing symptomatic COVID-19 infection after two doses and Moderna was 94.1% protective. Both are protective across age groups and racial and ethnic groups. J & J one-dose vaccine was 72% protective in the United States. It is not yet known if any of these vaccines prevent asymptomatic infection nor is it known if vaccinated people can transmit the virus if they do become infected but don't show symptoms.

The most common side effects are injection site pain, fatigue, headache, muscle pain, and joint pain. Some people in the trials reported fever. Younger adults, who have more robust immune systems, reported more side effects than older adults. These side effects are a sign of an immune system kicking into gear. They do not signal that the vaccine is unsafe.

To date there are no serious, long-term side effects associated with receipt of these vaccines. There have been reports of severe allergic reactions to the mRNA

vaccines and on rare occasions, can trigger a severe and potentially life-threatening reaction, which is treated with epinephrine. The CDC says people should be monitored for 15 minutes after getting a COVID-19 shot, and 30 minutes if they have a history of severe allergies.

The storage requirement for each of the vaccines is different, with the Pfizer vaccine having to be kept at a much lower temperature.

Figuring out how long the protection provided by any of these vaccines will last will take time. It's going to involve periodic blood draws from some volunteers to see what their antibody levels look like.

March Board of Governors (BOG) News



Spring is finally here!

As the saying goes, March winds bring April showers that bring May flowers. Speaking of winds, if the weather forecast includes a high wind advisory on a Monday evening and overnight, PLEASE do not put recycle and trash totes out on Monday evening. The last time this occurred the totes were blown over and we had debris all over the property.

Until further notice the Community Center remains closed. The only use of the facility is for contractors to use the bathrooms and the cleaning company. This restriction will remain in effect until all restrictions are removed by the Commonwealth.

As most everyone is aware, we had a water main break near 4 Autumn Drive. The issue was in the supply line (2" copper off the 8" ductile iron main). We also installed a street location shutoff for the area in case we have another issue in that area. Cheap money since the hole was already there. The Hudson Water Department assisted and was a great help with marking out the road to show us where the issue was located. Hydra-Tech made the repairs and, as usual, was most professional and helpful.

Scott Forbes, of S. K. Forbes General Contractors, made repairs to the most critical items on the list of building issues. He is now making repairs to all decks that have been identified in need of work. Scott Forbes also made repairs to multiple leaking gutters that surfaced during the Winter months.

In February 2021 HUB International, our master insurance broker, provided a "Unit Owner Letter" to help unit owners understand what coverage they should carry in their Homeowners (HO-6) policy.

Unit owners were asked to read the letter carefully. It was also recommended that unit owners share the letter with their homeowners' policy insurance agent to make sure they are adequately covered. The Master insurance policy has (and has had for a couple of years) a \$25,000 deductible. If a major event happens inside the unit, it would be very expensive for the unit owner if not adequately covered. If your HO-6 policy does not have \$25,000 coverage, you as a unit owner will be responsible for the difference between your HO-6 coverage and the Master Insurance Policy deductible.

The Fall Building and Grounds Committee findings identified 23 expired gas meters (i.e., seven years old or greater) in need of replacement. Last Fall, Eversource indicated that due to COVID-19 they were not replacing expired gas meters. The Board touched base with Eversource on Thursday, March 18th. We were told that gas meters were again being replaced. Based on the information provided the applicable owners were notified with the provided data. Unfortunately, the Board received incorrect information on who to contact regarding the gas meter replacement and the timeframe for replacement. According to Eversource on March 19th, gas meters will not be replaced until early Fall 2021. The Board has been told that Eversource will notify residents with gas meters that need to be replaced. No timeframe was given when Eversource would be sending out notifications. Once you are contacted by Eversource, it is your responsibility as a unit owner to coordinate and schedule a date/time to have the meter replaced. You will need to be home to give access to the Eversource Technician for them to make the change.

Please do not drive beyond the property posted speed limits!

It looks like 2021 promises to be a much better year.

Easter April 4th



Before Quail Run

Until about 25 years ago, the area of Quail Run, was a very large forest area.

Then Digital Equipment Corporation (later Intel) came in, cleared the land, built multiple buildings and moved in. Reed Road went from being a paper road, only on the map, that ended at the Rittenhouse's original home and mail box. Reed Road was then extended and connected to Technology Drive. There was also one BIG boulder on the side of the original and very narrow Reed Road, which many people unfortunately scraped or hit with their cars as they rounded a very dangerous curve. During the wintertime, people avoided going on this snowy and icy road!

Originally, there was a forest that included a path from the Seven Day Adventist Church on Marlborough Street to where Walmart is today. Some of the more energetic Hudson residents used to walk from their homes located in the Lake View community, (which is off of Marlborough Street), through the forest to go to Walmart.

With the clearing of the land the animals, who used to live in the woods, moved away into smaller and smaller areas. Then they were forced out of even their "safe" area where West Ridge is now located.

At the beginning of the development of Quail Run, there were few animals here. Now the animals, both mammals and birds, are starting to figure out how they can live with humans. We need to do the same. We may be a little uncomfortable seeing them around us,

but we need to keep in mind that they were here first. As for the turkeys, don't challenge them. They can be quite vicious if threatened.

Note: At the time of colonial settlement, the wild turkey was widespread in Massachusetts. Due to habitat loss and hunting, turkeys were extirpated from the state and the last known native bird was killed in 1851. In the 1970's, Mass Wildlife biologists trapped 37 turkeys in New York and released them in the Berkshires. In 1991, the wild turkey was named the state's official game bird. The estimated population is now between 30,000 and 35,000 birds! Under careful management, the future looks bright for turkeys; sportsmen, naturalists, and wildlife enthusiasts welcome their return.

April Fools' Day

Celebrated each year, while its exact history is shrouded in mystery, the embrace of April Fools' Day jokes by the media and major brands has ensured the unofficial holiday's long life.

In modern times, people have gone to great lengths to create elaborate April Fools' Day hoaxes. Newspapers, radio, TV stations and websites have participated in the April 1 tradition of reporting outrageous fictional claims that have fooled their audiences.

In 1957, the BBC reported that Swiss farmers were experiencing a record spaghetti crop and showed footage of people harvesting noodles from trees.

In 1985, Sports Illustrated writer George Plimpton tricked many readers when he ran a made-up article about a rookie pitcher named Sidd Finch who could throw a fastball over 168 miles per hour.

In 1992, National Public Radio ran a spot with former President Richard Nixon saying he was running for president again... only it was an actor, not Nixon, and the segment was all an April Fools' Day prank that caught the country by surprise.

In 1996, Taco Bell, the fast-food restaurant chain, duped people when it announced it had agreed to purchase Philadelphia's Liberty Bell and intended to rename it the Taco Liberty Bell. The fast food chain was quick to assure Americans that their access to the Taco Liberty Bell would not be hindered. Thousands of people called the headquarters of Taco Bell and the offices of the National Park Service, but were assured that it was a prank. White House Press Secretary Mike McCurry quipped that the Ford Motor Company was following suit, with the Lincoln Memorial being renamed the Lincoln Mercury Memorial.

In 1998, after Burger King advertised a "Left-Handed Whopper," scores of clueless customers requested the fake sandwich.

Google notoriously hosts an annual April Fools' Day prank that has included everything from "telepathic search", Mentalplex Technology - a search mechanism that actually reads your mind when you want to search for something, (after all, keyboards are so 20th century), and the ability to play Pac Man on Google Maps.

Did 3M "Command" Strips Leave Yellow Stains on Your White Woodwork?

Have you ever used a 3M "Command" product to mount anything to your white woodwork or doors here at Quail Run? They're an excellent product, readily removed, and touted for not leaving a stain. Well, maybe?

We recently removed two robe hooks that the previous owner of our unit had placed onto the backs of doors in two of the bathrooms. They've been there for at least 7 years, probably much longer. So, when we decided to remove them, we followed 3M's instructions, and pulled down along the door surface, and they came off without an issue - except, there was a clearly visible yellow stain. Ugh!

Solvent and "goo gone" didn't do a thing - absolutely no change. A search of the Internet revealed that it was not an adhesive problem, rather, it is a characteristic of oil paint! When left in the dark for an extended period of time, it starts to yellow (due to a photochemical reaction that I won't get into, but you can explore on your own). The solution? Light!

We placed a bright LED lamp a few inches from the stain, and left it on during the day for about 4 days. days. Each day the stain faded more, until it was faded enough that we no longer notice it.

From My Kitchen to Yours

A short note about an Asian cooking staple: Soy Sauce

Most of us grew up on LaChoy or maybe Kikkoman brands of soy sauce. Many of those soy sauces are very high in sodium content: 50% or more of your recommended daily intake in a single table-spoon. Fortunately, you can now get reduced or even low-salt soy sauces, but they are still near 23% per tablespoon. Also, most soy sauce contains wheat, but recently some certified Gluten-free products have made it onto grocery shelves.

[Disclaimer: I prefer Japanese soy sauces over Chinese suppliers.] Most soy sauce today is produced using a streamlined method introduced during the difficulties of WW II, in stainless-steel industrial vats, that frequently skip the traditional fermentation stage by adding other vegetable proteins to the soy. This frequently results in an unpleasant sharpness. Even when it is fermented, it is often just for a few weeks or months.

For a superior soy sauce, try one made using the pre-Industrial centuries-old method, where the soy is fermented in ancient wooden barrels, for at least a year and often for four years. These traditional soy sauces have only a few simple ingredients: soy beans, wheat, salt and water (and of course, yeast to produce fermentation). The result is a mellow, rich soy sauce missing those "sharp edges". The difference in taste is not unlike comparing a cheap bin wine to an aged French Bordeaux! Yamaroku is one of the old family brewers, with a wonderful product. You'll pay for it: a 20 oz bottle will run about \$25. I haven't found it locally, just on-line. My first order arrived directly from Japan, without a hint of English on the bottle's label! Enjoy!
