HEALTHY LIVING

Hope for Alzheimer's





Our Quail Run community has just raised a significant amount of money for research into the causes of Alzheimer's disease.

Alzheimer's disease is quite common among older adults - an estimated 5.8 million Americans live with it today. The disease manifests itself as memory loss, changes in behavior and problems thinking.

Scientists have long known that harmful collections of proteins between nerve cells, called plaques as well as proteins inside nerve cells, called tangles wreak havoc on the brain, killing cells and

disrupting normal brain functions as they spread. What exactly causes these plaques and tangles to develop and why they get them is still up in the air.

A neuroscientist named Mark Mattson, at John Hopkins University, thinks it has something to do with our modern eating habits - particularly the timing of our meals. Dr. Mattson has spent decades researching calorie intake and Alzheimer's disease. In several studies of mice genetically altered to display symptoms of Alzheimer's, he has found that those mice fed intermittent fasting diets, where you cycle through short periods of eating and longer periods of fasting, fared better than those who ate whenever they wanted. They had better cognitive function, lived longer and had less plaque build up in their brains.

Valter Longo, a professor at the University of Southern California has also spent decades studying the link between aging and fasting. And like Mattson, he's seen slower cognitive decline and increased longevity in mice on fasting diets.

Currently, human studies are being conducted but it's far too early to reach any conclusions. But for now, and until we know more about the disease, Longo says that limiting calorie intake to about 12 hours a day could be a good way to help brain health.

"Winter Time Patience"

What do you do when Winter months are closing in and unexpectedly COVID concerns take hold of everyone requiring a new change in lifestyle? Well, **Trudy** and **Phil Durand** had the answer. You design and build a bird feeder. Not just a little bird feeder, but a BIG bird feeder with two levels!

Phil patiently went to the "drawing board", while also gathering all materials required for the bird feeder project. Materials required for the project consisted of pre-

treated wood, glue, paints of various colors, brushes, roofing shingles (not fake), nails, and plexiglass for the windows and lower level feeder, along with all measuring and cutting tools.

As you can see by the pictures, Phil shows us that a lot of patience is

required to complete a project of this kind. The feeder consists of a lower and upper level with eight support columns placed along the periphery on the lower flooring and extending to the lower level roofline to give maximum structural support to the feeder.

Centered in the lower level is the plexiglass seed container for the birds. The upper level consists of two outlets with the seeds flowing out to the balconies. The porch railings have 150 balusters, each one was cut and glued individually.



On top of the roof is the removable chimney used to fill the bird seed into the house. By the way,



the chimney replicates the real thing, with 12 rows of recessed "brick". Each row is grooved with simulated grey concrete paint replicating the cement found on chimneys. On top of the roof are real commercial shingles tacked into place with small brads.

Robin's egg blue paint is used for the ceilings....yes, there is an "Old Wives Tale" that states, "If you paint it robin's egg blue, this will deter spiders and bugs from the ceilings".

All told, the bird feeder weighs about 47 pounds (but who is counting), that is without the weight of the bird seed!!!


Trudy and Phil had planned on giving the bird feeder to their son Paul who lives in Princeton, MA. But... Paul recently spotted a bear meandering on his property! The bear would just love to discover what a gem this bird feeder would be for a nice treat, just waiting to be raided!

In conclusion, the dimensions of the bird feeder are 21.5" long, 20.5" wide and 29.5" tall.

Phil has currently downsized his passion, and is now making smaller bird feeders.

July Board of Governors (BOG) News



Summer is certainly passing very quickly. With the COVID-19 cases on the increase again, hopefully everyone is being cautious.

Everyone is aware the Community Center is now open. We had the cleaning company do a "reopening cleaning" as there were multiple items that needed attention. Thanks to **David Bernhardt** the window covering in the storage room has been repaired and the rusted parts in the refrigerator freezer replaced. Thanks David! We also installed a keyless lock on the Community Center door. Hopefully everyone will find the new lock easier to use.

The turn on of the irrigation system in the May/June timeframe was delayed due to the Town of Hudson's water restrictions. In May, restrictions were at level three and without significant rain this could easily have become a level four. During June we had two heat waves for a total 11 days and no measurable precipitation. We have now had the wettest July on record. To bring up the irrigation system at this juncture costs the Association approximately \$5,000, plus time and material costs to repair/replace sprinkler heads, the cost of water, and give or take \$3,000 to shut down the system. As a result, based on the remaining short season, the Board voted to not bring up the irrigation system this year.

With all the heat and lack of rain in June, the grass seed put down by J&J&Son Lawncare did not germinate. This permitted crabgrass and nutsedge to grow. J&J&Son Lawncare will address both of these invasive grasses/weeds. They have fertilized our lawns three times and sprayed our trees for insects.

At the request of the Town of Hudson Fire Department, signs have been obtained to identify all host units with building water shutoffs. They will be installed shortly.



In the next week or two, based on the weather, J&J&Son Lawncare will be pruning all shrubs and plantings growing against the wood trim without regard to blue stakes. Shrubs and plantings must be 18 inches from the siding and no higher than the bottom of the front window or front porch railing.

J&J&Son Lawncare will also be cutting back invasive branches on our trees.

The shed has water infiltration from the roof and a very wet floor. We have asked Scott Forbes to repair both. There is also debris behind the shed that needs to be removed and unused items in the shed. The Board will address how best to clean all of this up at our August Board meeting.

Scott Forbes made additional repairs to our common areas.

We have contracted with a new painting vendor, Thiago's Painting. Our prior contractor moved out of the area. Thiago's Painting is from Marlborough and came highly recommended. Thiago will begin paint touch-ups based on a list as soon as weather permits.

Massachusetts Wildlife has requested that we temporarily remove all bird feeders and bird baths. There is a disease that is killing birds and the congregation of birds may cause the disease to spread. Also, bird baths are a primary breeding ground for mosquitoes which may carry West Nile or Triple E.

The testing of the fire sprinkler system and fire alarm system is being scheduled for this Fall. **This requires access to every unit's basement.** This is a requirement of the Town of Hudson Fire Department. Please make sure you are available or that the master key works for your unit. You will be notified once the specific date is known.

Please do not drive beyond the property posted speed limits!

Summer Solstice Celebration!




The festivities began with a heart healthy walk-a-thon where folks walked the circles. and were rewarded with t-shirts and medals.

Did You Know Inventions By Women

The Car Heater: We all owe our thanks to Margaret A Wilcox who invented the car heater in 1893! (Margaret also invented a combined clothes and dishwasher.)

Monopoly: This popular board game was designed by Elizabeth Magie in 1904, originally called the Landlord's Game.



Her game was ripped off by Charles Darrow who sold it to Parker Brother's 30 years later. However, Parker Brothers later paid Elizabeth \$500 for her game. **The Fire Escape**: The fire escape was invented by Anna Connelly in 1887.

The Life Raft: The lifesaving life raft was invented by Maria Beasely in 1882. Maria also invented a machine that makes barrels.

Residential Solar Heating: Solar heating for residential housing was invented by Dr. Maria Telkes in 1947. Dr. Telkes was a Psychiatrist in addition to being a solar-power pioneer.

The Medical Syringe: The medical syringe which could be operated with only one hand was invented by a woman by the name of Letitia Geer in 1899.

The Modern Electric Refrigerator: The electric refrigerator was invented by Florence Parpart in 1914. Florence also invented an improved street cleaning machine in addition to the refrigerator.

The Ice Cream Maker: The ice cream maker was invented by a woman named Nancy Johnson in 1843. Her patented design is still used today!



Computer Algorithm: Ada Lovelace is essentially the first computer programmer due to her work with Charles Babbage at the University of London in 1842. In fact, her notes were an essential key to helping Alan Turing's work on the first modern computers in the 1940s.

Telecommunications Technology: Some of the Telecommunication Technology developed by Dr Shirley Jackson include portable fax, touch tone telephone, solar cells, fiber optic cables, and the technology behind caller ID and call waiting.

The Dishwasher: The dishwasher was invented by Josephine Cochrane in 1887. She even marketed her machine to hotel owners and even opened her own factory without help!

Kevlar: This life-saving material that is five times stronger than steel and used to make bulletproof vests was invented in 1965 by Stephanie Kwolek. It was initially intended to be used in automobile tires.

The Modern Paper Bag: Margaret Knight invented a machine that makes square bottomed paper bags in 1871.

From My Kitchen to Yours

Peel your Asparagus! He said, "What?"

I have to admit, I didn't swallow the suggestion whole when I first encountered it in "The Victory Garden Cookbook" [one of my absolute staples in the kitchen; from the PBS television series of the same name]. The author credits the method to Julia Childs. And it changed my relationship with asparagus forever.

[Secret admission: I measure a cookbook by whether they have an interesting method of cooking and serving cauliflower ... if it's just cheese sauce, I put it down]!

As "The Victory Garden" explains, many of us grew up on the method where you let the asparagus stalk "snap' at it's natural breaking point, discarding the thick stalk. Never again! You won't believe what you were missing. You will need a "gentle" peeler, that only barely grazes the outside of the stalk, or you'll find yourself with nothing left of the asparagus! OXO makes an awesome one (try Target, which has a section devoted to the OXO product line), which I've fallen in love with for peeling any "carrot shaped" items because you have really good control on how much it chews off the vegetable (but it doesn't work on large veggies like



So, next time you're in a mood for asparagus, take your veggie peeler, and as gently as possible, peel it. Whether you steam it, blanch it, or toss it into soup, your cooked asparagus will be missing all of those "stringy" and chewy attributes! It is astonishing how soft and delicate asparagus is, once it's been peeled.

Just A Reminder

Blood Clots/Stroke -They Now Have a Fourth Indicator, the Tongue

STROKE IDENTIFICATION: Remember the 1st three letters.....S. T. R.

Doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

S: Ask person to SMILE.

T: Ask the person to TALK and speak a simple sentence.

(e.g.: I like Chicken Soup)

R: Ask the person to RAISE both arms.

NOTE: Another 'sign' of a stroke is to ask the person to 'stick' out his or her TONGUE.

If the tongue is 'crooked', (e.g.: if it goes to one side or the other), this may also be an indication of a stroke.

If the person has trouble with ANY of these tasks, call the emergency number immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.
