#### SILENT HEART ATTACKS



According to the *Harvard Health Letter*, silent heart attacks (SMI's) account for a shocking 45-50% of all heart attacks.

They're called "silent" because their signs and symptoms are commonly minor or brief. When SMI's do present with chest discomfort it's typically mild. That's why these attacks are often ignored, or mistakenly attributed to other causes such as heartburn or muscle pain. SMI's can create scar tissue in the heart and raise the risk of a second and even more dangerous heart attack. The good news is that you can be better equipped to recognize the warning signs should you or a loved one face this situation.



Knowing these 7 Commonly Missed Warning Signs of Silent Heart Attacks can help:

- 1. Shortness of breath
- 2. Weakness
- 3. Dizziness
- 4. Nausea or vomiting
- 5. Unusual fatigue
- 6. Indigestion
- 7. Unexplained pain in the back, jaw, or elsewhere

If you have any of these symptoms, it would be important to check with your primary care physician or your cardiologist and they would most likely want to see you and then run some tests to rule out a heart attack.

#### Did You Get Your REAL ID?

Beginning May 3, 2023, every air traveler 18 years of age and older will need a REAL ID compliant driver's license or identification card, or another TSA acceptable form of identification (i.e., a passport), for all domestic air travel and to enter certain federal facilities.

Due to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, The Department of Homeland Security (DHS) extended the REAL ID full enforcement date from October 1, 2021 to May 3, 2023.

To get a REAL ID you will need to make an appointment and go into an RMV service center or AAA members can visit a AAA office.

The cost to obtain a REAL or Standard driver's license ID card is the same; however, you'll need to provide additional documentation. For a REAL ID card.


You will need to prove and provide your:

- 1) U.S. citizenship or lawful presence and...
- 2) Social Security number and ...
- 3) Massachusetts residency.

All documents must be originals; photocopies and laminated documents will not be accepted.

## November Board of Governors (BOG) News

Hope everyone had a great Thanksgiving holiday. Warm wishes to everyone for a happy and healthy rest of the holiday season.

With COVID-19 cases on the rise again, the Annual Budget Meeting has been cancelled for the second year. While most Quail Run unit owners were initially vaccinated, there is concern with contacting the virus from folks that have not been vaccinated or not had the booster shot.

The Board wants to thank all members of the Building and Grounds Committee for inspecting our property. The Board finds their input of great importance in helping keep our community well maintained. The inspection reports will be summarized in the coming weeks. Due to the holiday season and having many items on the list, this may take some time.

Due to the weather this Summer and the late Fall many items were/are on hold. No spot painting occurred over the Summer and Fall. Repairs to the fence behind Strawberry and Rotherham was delayed.

ARR-MAX will not be at Quail Run until early December. ARR-MAX will only address the most critical road/driveway issues due to the Winter weather conditions.

Scott Forbes, our general maintenance contractor, has been making critical repairs to decks, siding, etc. Most items on Scott's list must wait until Spring.

Fall cleanup began on November 18<sup>th</sup>. The gutters were cleaned, and all street and ornamental trees were fertilized.

The access keypad code to the Community Center and shed were changed. The code will not be published but passed by word of mouth on a need-to-know basis. This is due to the number of missing items. The missing items from the Community Center are a dry board eraser, a cow bell, steak knives, scissors, one slider for moving furniture and ten chairs. Three boxes of scalloped edge cedar shingles and a ladder are missing from the shed.

Winter is here, stay warm!



Since it's the holiday season, hope everyone carefully reads the Rules and Regulations and understands what outside decorations are permitted. Also, as of the first of the year ALL holiday decorations are to be removed even if not specifically specified in the Rules and Regulations.

There are still 20 units that do not have master key access. Per the Association By-laws access must be provided to the Association in cases of emergency or notified scheduled events. The easiest way for everyone to do that is to assure that your front door lock is compatible with the Quail Run master key.

Use of The Dartmouth Group after hours number is for emergencies (e.g., life, blood, fire, etc.) only. All calls to The Dartmouth Group telephone number after 5:00 P. M. Monday through Friday and on weekends go to the after-hours number. Non-emergency after-hour calls and their directly related charges will be billed to the unit owner. If you need to contact The Dartmouth Group about a routine matter, please do so during their weekday daytime office hours.

As of November 15, 2021, Massachusetts Wildlife continues to request that we temporarily remove all bird feeders and bird baths. This is not mandatory but recommended.

## Senior Passes for Parks

Both Massachusetts and the US National Park systems offer low-cost lifetime park passes for seniors age 62 and over.

The Massachusetts pass entitles the vehicle that the senior passholder is riding in, to free vehicle parking. The lifetime pass is issued for a one-time \$10 fee. It does not cover user fees if there are any. Most areas such as Hopkinton State Park only charge for parking. You can download the application at: www.mass.gov/how-to/get -a-senior-parking-pass.

The National Parks offer a senior pass for a one-time \$80 fee. The pass entitles the senior and up to three passengers in the vehicle free entrance to the park and parking. It usually offers a discount on any user fees such as picnicking, camping, or tours. The easiest way to get a pass is to go to a national park headquarters building that issues the passes. The Assabet River Wildlife Refuge Visitor Center on Hudson Road does not issue passes. The nearest location to Hudson is at the Great Meadows National Wildlife Refuge headquarters, at 73 Weir Hill Rd., in Sudbury, MA.

## Windows 11: Ready, or Not? By Dave Bernhardt

So, you have Windows 10, and as of October 5<sup>th</sup> Windows 11 was released. Should you "upgrade" to Windows 11?

First, Windows 10 will be supported with security patches for the next four years, so there's no rush.

Second, many computers will not be allowed to run Windows 11 because the CPU is too old - about six years old is now too old? For Windows 10 users, you can see if your system is allowed to up-rev to Windows 11 by doing a "Windows update", where it will tell you if your system is Windows 11 ready. Many are not and won't be supported, so a new computer would be required. Gee thanks Microsoft!

Third, Windows 11 doesn't have much new to offer. There are no life-altering changes. ## Did You Know....? Henry Ford and the BBQ

On June 16, 1903, the Ford Motor Company was established. Henry Ford was the founder. This was not his first rodeo, as he had previously operated the Henry Ford Company. He left that company and took his name with him. What became of the Henry Ford Company? It became known as the Cadillac Motor Company.

What does any of this have to do with anything BBQ related? Hang on, here is the rest of the story.

Ford's Model T, which would number in the millions sold, required 100 board feet of wood to build. Ford despised waste. His motto was reduce, reuse, and recycle. He was also a nature-lover, an environmentalist of his time. His



escape from the stress of life was camping in the great outdoors.

Frustrated by the mountains of sawdust his lumber mills created, he and his partners sought a way to utilize the scrap wood and sawdust into a useful (and profitable) product.

An idea came to him one day as he was camped with some friends in the wilds of Michigan. After his party spent a long time collecting sufficient wood for a



campfire, an idea formed in Ford's mind. Upon returning back to the lumber mill, he shared the idea with some of his partners and set to work on it.

The idea? Lumping a fistful of sawdust and cornstarch with a bit of tar to form a briquette. After charring it, it performed exactly what Ford imagined it would. He then built a charcoal briquette factory adjacent to his lumber mill where the waste from one became the fuel for the other. A new Model T was now frequently sold with a bonus bag of Ford Charcoal Briquettes, so you could drive into the woods to camp and not worry about finding campfire wood.

So now you know. Ford not only created the modern automobile industry which takes millions to work and back each workday, but he also created the weekend grilling and camping industries.

In 1951, the Ford Charcoal Briquette Company was sold. The new company was named after Ford's real estate partner who helped him find the land to supply wood for building the early Ford automobiles: E.J. Kingsford. Kingsford Charcoal is now the largest producer of charcoal briquettes in the world.

# 3G Cell Phones Will No Longer Work!

All of the cell-phone carriers (Verizon, etc.) are removing 3G signal capability as of the end of 2021! If you have a phone that supports 4G LTE or 5G you are OK, but if you have an old phone that only supports 3G or CDMA, then it will no longer work. Smartphones that will be affected are any iPhone 5 or earlier, or Samsung Galaxy S4 or earlier. If you're not sure, you can stop into any cell phone store and they will check it for you. Or you can do it yourself using instructions that are widely available on the Internet. The instructions will explain how to find your IMEI number, and then how to look it up on the internet.

If your phone is being obsoleted, most cell-phone stores will accept it for recycling at no charge.

# Condo care

The following Condo Care hints and maintenance tips are recommendations by residents of Quail Run.

**Ceiling Fan settings** - Summer season, set fan to run counter clockwise; Winter season, set fan to run clockwise.

**Fireplace cleaning** - should be performed every five years.

**Furnace/AC Filter** - your furnace/AC filter should be changed at least every six months for optimal performance. Maintenance should be performed in the Spring and Fall.

**Furnace Humidifier** - Aprilaire brand, set handle on the side of the humidifier unit to the "Winter" setting, or "Summer" setting depending on the season.

**Garbage Disposal** - To clean it, run ice cubes or baking soda and vinegar to scour away any gunky buildup.

**Gas Meters** - must be changed every seven years. If you are overdue, PLEASE call Eversource Gas Company at 800-592-2000, to replace your meter at no charge to you.

**In-House Vacuum cleaner** - Do not forget to empty it periodically.

#### Lights -

**Dusk to Dawn** LED's, outside garage and porch lights: LED sensor lights can be purchased at Amazon.com, a 3 pack of bulbs for \$18.99. Manufacture is Minger, 7 watts LED sensor bulbs, model no. LSB002.

Kitchen Recessed Light replacements: Utilitech, is the brand name of a retrofit product that enables you to replace the existing lights. Just remove the metal trim on the light, remove the bulb, and screw in the new unit into the existing socket.

The product is Utilitech, model number is 2700K. Make sure you purchase the correct size that fits the housing unit for a 5 - 6 inch opening as marked on the outside of the box.

**Refrigerator maintenance** - Cleaning the coils under the refrigerator is important! This cleaning should be done at least once a year. If you have pets and/or abnormal dust, (which our units do because of the forced hot air heating), cleaning the coils should be done twice a year.

**Rock salt** - please keep some on hand and be careful, ice forms very quickly on the TREX front and back steps, and the walk ways.

**Rodent (Ultra Sonic) Repellent Device** - They are electronic devices that plug into a wall outlet. These devices send a high frequency noise that critters can't stand. The noise can not be heard by humans (but may bother hamsters or some dogs).

**Smoke Alarms** - If you have replaced your smoke alarm detectors with new Kidde smoke alarm and carbon monoxide detectors, there is a double A battery in each that needs to be replaced yearly. If your smoke alarm detectors are ten plus years old, they need to be replaced.

**Thermostat -** Do not forget to change your Thermostat battery twice a year.

Water Detectors - The Watch Dog Water Alarm Model BWD-HWA is a small device 3x4x1.5 inches that you place on the floor in an area that you want to monitor for water such as next to a water heater, washing machine, dishwasher or anywhere. It can detect as little as 1/32 of an inch of water. If it detects water it will sound an alarm as loud as a smoke detector.

Water turn-off valves - the next time a plumber visits, ask him to check the water valves under the various sinks and toilets. These can freeze up over time and when there is an emergency such as the toilet flooding, the valve may not work. Also run all your faucets in the spare bathrooms and jacuzzi tub periodically.

**Windows** - seal out cold drafts around window seams, use MORTITE strips.
