#### Electric Vehicles at Quail Run

With the increased availability of electric vehicles from the major automobile manufacturers, the Board of Governors is receiving inquiries about electric vehicle charging at The Villages of Quail Run. The answer to this question contains both good news and bad news.

The electric energy distribution system at Quail Run was designed and installed over 20 years ago. Electric vehicles were just a gleam in automobile designer's eye at that time. Today there are three electric vehicle charging levels as follows:

Level 1: This vehicle is charged off a 120-volt typical home outlet which is rated at 15 amps. This is what is installed in the Quail Run units.

Level 2: This vehicle is charged off a 208–240-volt outlet similar to an outlet used by an electric dryer but not the same. Unit owners cannot install a level 2 home charging station in their unit; the electrical distribution system cannot support that type of charger as they typically require a 200-amp service panel (circuit breaker panel). The units at Quail Run only have 120-amp service panels. Furthermore, the underground electrical cables are not sized to allow the installation of a 200-amp service panel. Therefore, level 2 home charging stations at Quail Run are not permitted at Quail Run.

Level 3: This is a high voltage circuit charger that is generally utilized in public charging stations.

The bad news is that only vehicles that can be charged at Quail Run are Level 1 vehicles which utilize an existing 120-volt outlet.

Someone may ask if they can charge their car from solar panels. The short answer is yes, you can, but not from solar panels at Quail Run. Solar panels of any kind in any location are not allowed at Quail Run. If you are contemplating an electric vehicle purchase, please remember that the only charging that can be done in your garage at Quail Run is a level 1 vehicle. As a side note, the Hudson Fire Department has notified us that at this time they have no efficient method of extinguishing electric vehicle battery fires. It should also be noted that Quail Run garages are not equipped with a fire suppression sprinkler. So, any fire in your garage could rapidly turn into a real inferno.

#### Senior SAFE - Fire Safety Program

On June 15, many residents of Quail Run enjoyed a very informative Fire Safety program by members of the Hudson Fire Department's Fire Prevention Team. The team provided us with many valuable and important facts and tips such as:

Have your dryer vents cleaned out once a year to prevent a fire.

Use heavy duty extension cords only. Do not plug multiple extension cords together and do not run extension cords under rugs or furniture.

Use space heaters with caution and plug it directly into your electric outlet. Do not use an extension cord.

Do not use your oven to warm up the house.

Do not store flammable material on top of your stove or on the counter next to the stove.

To prevent carbon monoxide poisoning, be sure that your outdoor vents are not covered by heavy snow.

Keep a "clean and clear" path in and out of your home.

Keep a *File of Life* magnet on your refrigerator with a list of your medication inside the pocket. This will permit first responders to use the medication list to help you in an emergency. Be sure to keep the list of medications updated.

A great deal of discussion dealt with Smoke and CO2 Detectors including:

Changing the batteries in your detectors when you change the clocks in fall and spring.

Keeping track of each detector's expiration date. Hard-wired detectors do not last forever.

Replacing expired hard-wired detectors with new detectors that are compatible with the expired detectors.

#### Future Visit:

Firefighters will be returning in October to assist residents who need help changing the batteries in their detectors. Residents <u>must</u> provide the batteries for their detectors, but the firefighters will replace the batteries as well as check the fire and CO2 detector expiration dates. Dates for this event and how to sign up for this service will be announced in October.

In October we should also have more information from the Fire Department regarding training in the use of the AED unit in our Community Center.

#### How to Clean Your Deck

I have tested a very good deck cleaning method. It is based on Bob Vila's instructions at:

http://www.bobvila.com/articles/homemade-deck-cleaner/

#### In a nutshell:

- 1. You need a stiff natural-bristle broom, that is small enough to fit into whatever bucket you have. Also, a smaller brush to clean under the railings. Robinsons Hardware and Lowe's in Hudson have these brushes, with or without handles.
- 2. Remove everything from the area to be cleaned, so that the cleaner doesn't affect it. Suggest doing a deck in two parts, moving the furniture from one side to the other.
- 3. When you're ready to start, mix together in your bucket:
  - a. 2 gallons hot tap water
  - b. 1 cup OxyClean bleach powder (DO NOT SUBSTITUTE FOR THE OxyClean. DO NOT USE Clorox!)
  - c. REPEAT: ONLY OxyClean powder.
  - d. 1 cup Borax cleaning powder
  - e. 1/4 cup liquid dish soap (Dawn, etc.). Mix well.
- 4. Wet down the deck with a hose. Also wet-down any sensitive plants that may get overspray or splashed from the cleaner. This is not nearly as bad for your plants as the chlorinated cleaners, but still use caution.
- 5. Use the bristle broom to scrub the cleaner into the deck surface, and let set 10-15 minutes. Keep it wet -- don't let it dry out. Suggest going back over it in a second pass, which serves both wetting and cleaning purposes. USE CAUTION when washing the stairs as they will be slippery. Rinse thoroughly with water when done.

I rate this 4.5 stars. Not perfect, but the only remaining green tint was in an area under the railing that I missed. Total time for doing the deck in two sections was about one hour total. No aggressive physical activity.

NOTE: Do not use a pressure sprayer. Trex and the Board and Governor's both disapprove of their use on Quail Run decks.

How to customize and use Control Center on iPhone: A complete guide

The Control Center on your iPhone gives you one-tap access to features you regularly use. Therefore, you can turn on or off the Wi-Fi, activate or deactivate Airplane Mode, adjust the Volume or your Display Brightness, etc. But it's not limited to this. You may add, remove and rearrange options in the Control Center. So, let's know how to customize what you see in Control Center on your iPhone to use it like a pro!

#### **Options in Control Center**

**Alarm**: Set a wake-up timer or change the Sleep Focus schedule.

**Calculator**: Open the calculator with one tap. Also, you may access the scientific calculator by rotating your iPhone.

**Code Scanner**: Use the device's built-in camera to scan a OR code.

**Portrait Orientation Lock**: You may turn this on to prevent screen rotation while FaceTiming or using any other app/service.

**Brightness**: To change the display's brightness, long press on the Brightness icon and drag the slider up or down.

**Volume**: To change the volume of any audio playing, just press the Volume control and drag the volume slider up or down.

**Camera**: Tap and hold on to the camera from Control Center to take selfies or portraits and record videos.

**Flashlight**: You may turn your camera's LED flash into a torch. Long press to change the brightness.

**Dark Mode**: Use your phone in Dark Mode to avoid straining your eyes and get the best viewing experience in low light.

**Guided Access**: If anyone uses your iPhone, turn on Guided Access. It will restrict your iPhone to a specific app and manage the accessible features.

Low Power Mode: When your iPhone's battery is low, or you don't have access to power outlets, switch to Low Power Mode.

**Quick Notes**: Take <u>quick notes</u> directly from Control Center while using an app or any screen.

**Stopwatch**: Calculate the length of an activity and record lap times.

**Text Size**: You can increase or decrease the text size for a better viewing experience.

**Voice Memos**: You may customize Control Center on iPhone to add <u>Voice Memos</u>. So, you can quickly record using the iPhone's built-in microphone.

**Screen mirroring**: Wirelessly stream audio, video, and images to Apple TV and other AirPlaysupported devices.

Screen Recording: Long press on Screen Recording to start recording your screen or broadcast on Instagram/Messenger. You may turn off your device's microphone.

Sound Recognition: Turning on Sound Recognition control will detect specific sounds like alarms, sirens, etc., and alert you.

**Hearing**: If you use hearing aids, connect or disconnect them quickly or use Live Listen on your AirPods from Control Center on your iPhone.

Wallet: Adding Wallet control allows you to easily access cards for Apple Pay or other services like movie tickets, plane passes, and more.



#### Things to Keep Your Place Up with the Times

New: GFI outlets that beep when tripped.

Yes, your home is already overrun with things that beep to tell you they need attention. Smoke and carbon monoxide detector batteries that need replacement, leak detectors you've put next to the washing machine, and your hot water heater, and on and on.

Here's another item to add to that list: GFI outlets that chirp when they trip.

So what? Well, it matters. Your A/C system has a condensate pump that's plugged into a GFI outlet. If for some reason that outlet trips, the pump will loose power. Most of the condensate pumps have a "full switch" to tell whatever sends it water that they are full and not to send it more water, but not all A/C installers bother to hook them up. And the new "condensing gas furnaces and hot-water heaters" also need condensate pumps. So, if the pump shuts off and the overflow interlock was never hooked up, you're going to have water all over the floor.

I can vouch: I have two neighbors who both learned the hard way, when the GFI outlet on the pump tripped, and the water kept pouring into the nonworking pump.

The solution is a GFI outlet that "chirps" if it's tripped. So you'll go, "what's that noise" and sooner or later you'll find the tripped pump outlet, hopefully before it overflows.

The chirping GFI outlets don't cost any more than the non-chirping type. I recommend that you have your favorite electrician install one for you on their next visit. You might find you actually need two, as we did

#### July - August Board of Governors (BOG) News

After The Villages at Quail Run annual meeting and Board election, the new Board all agreed on member roles as follows: President-Diane Bemis, Vice President-Mike McCormack, Treasurer-John DeRusha, Member at large-Alison Towle and Clerk-Klaus Schneller.

The trash contract with E.L. Harvey is up in November. Gina from The Dartmouth Group is exploring new vendors for trash pickup.

Thiago's Painting completed painting the buildings on 1, 2, 3, 5 and 7 Autumn Drive as well as 60 basement window frames and the mailbox pedestals.

When the irrigation system was installed, the irrigation system control boxes were incorrectly hooked up to 220-amp breakers instead of 15-amp breakers. The Board is getting an electric company to install new circuit breaker boxes at each of the main power panels to prevent potential electrocution of personnel working on the irrigation system. The irrigation system continues to have issues with sprinkler heads, piping etc. The irrigation system issues that have been reported to The Dartmouth Group will continue to be addressed by F.C. Carias Irrigation Inc. They will be on the property when they are available. Please be patient during this repair process. The Board voted to only run the irrigation system on Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights to conserve water and reduce our water bill. F.C. Carias Irrigation Inc. will be changing the irrigation system clocks as soon as possible.

Ellingwood Construction completed the drainage repair and fixed sprinkler heads on July 13 at 6-11 Autumn Drive. The circles at 5-7 and 6-11 Autumn Drive are scheduled to be milled and paved the week of July 24th.

The Board had a discussion about electric vehicles at VQR since they are increasing in popularity. Electric or Hybrid vehicles are ok to plug in if they can use the

115V 15-amp plug in your garage. VQR cannot support or accommodate fully electric vehicles that require 240V. The breaker box in each unit is rated for 125A 110V service. The maximum load can be 100 amps. Also, the wire gauge in the unit and underground cannot support the 208/240V needed for charging vehicles. In order to support this, all-underground wiring would have to be changed, the Breaker box would need to be upgraded to 200A service and the meter boxes on the main panel would have to change.

The fire alarm system has been repaired following the June 24th lightning strike. The fire alarm relay switches were burned out and had to be replaced. Surge protectors were also installed and should prevent damage to the fire alarm relay switches in the future. Previously, there were no surge protectors. The June 2nd lightning strike also did some damage to 4/6 Rotherham Way. S. K. Forbes General Contractors made the needed repairs.

The fire alarm system continues to report trouble codes and false alarms. The system wiring runs underground and there are constant short circuits in the system due to corroded wiring and compromised underground pipes. Digging up the cables is not an option due to the cost. Therefore, Gina from The Dartmouth Group is getting a quote from Norel for radio boxes on each power panel.

Tree pruning is half done and will be completed in the next few weeks. Pruning of all front unit beds with J&J Landscaping has been started.

The road speed humps have a fresh coat of reflective paint thanks to the efforts of **Bill McPhail** and **Ken Hart.** 

The Board continues to face several issues, future challenges and budgetary concerns. As a result, the following email was sent on July 21st to all unit owners/residents with email addresses listing the items of concern.

#### "Hello All,

After our most recent BOG meeting it was decided that we should communicate to the Quail Run Community a few very important issues that we have been dealing with as of late. We have tried diligently to keep all expenses under control but there are circumstances beyond our control that are coming in the near future.

- 1. Trash collection we understand the frustration some of you have been experiencing over the delayed or missed trash pickup. Please understand that, though frustrating, we are lucky that our vendor will pick up on the following day, if they miss your circle. Many other contractors will not do this, but rather will simply skip the pick up until the next week. Our original contract with Mr. Trashman, who recently merged with Harvey trash collection, is over in the fall. We are seeking a new vendor and may be changing vendors but, the price will surely increase. Currently we are paying \$38,000 for trash collection. We are being quoted prices that average \$48,000 per year.
- 2. Bee holes in the ceiling of front porches will be dealt with, but please understand that we cannot hire someone to do this repair at any one address immediately, but rather will make a list of all addresses needing this service and hire a repair person to do all repairs at once in order to be more cost effective. Please understand that we are not ignoring you!
- **3. Mice** entering your unit are the responsibility of the unit owner and not the association. The Association will continue to make repairs to possible mice infiltration locations. We recommend Hudson Pest but the unit owner is responsible for the cost.
- 4. Plumbing issues are the responsibility of the unit owner unless it involves the water main pipe which serves multiple units. If you are unsure of a plumbing issue, please call a board member to inspect the situation. Then a decision can be made regarding payment by the unit owner or the association. However, please understand that any water damage to the ceilings and walls of your unit is your responsibility, not the association's.
- 5. Spigots are the responsibility of the unit owner, however, please be sure that if spigots are replaced that they are freeze proof. We recommend DeMello Plumbers in Hudson for this repair since they are very familiar with our property and will replace your leaking spigot properly with a quality spigot.
- 6. Fire Alarm systems Recently lightning damage impacted several units and was an unexpected expense, (over \$10,000 in repairs to fire alarm systems). In addition, we are now faced with a need to upgrade our 20 year-old alarm system to better serve our community. Please know that we are all safe and well protected. We know that the cost of the alarm system upgrade will be \$13,000. We have no choice in this situation because the wires

- that run in conduits under the roads are failing and causing numerous trouble conditions.
- **7. Budgetary concerns** are on the rise here at Quail Run. We have a number of issues that will impact our finances in the near future.
- a. Water, Sewer and Stormwater fees are all projected to increase at least 10 to 15% each. We have already been informed by the Town that next year's increase will be in the same range, 10 to 15%. The Stormwater fee alone will be around \$15,000 a year. This will impact your monthly fees.
- b. Paving roads is an ongoing issue we have begun to do some paving and continue to do regular crack sealing but please understand that the roads will need paving in the coming years. We are hoping to do this over several years to reduce the annual impact on your fees. As a point of information paving one of our circles costs \$40,000 and will increase as each year goes by. This likely will impact your fees.
- c. Back decks are an issue that will need to be addressed sooner rather than later. We have been repairing them as we go but, though all are safe to use, some will likely fail in the next few years. This will be a major financial undertaking at which time a serious financial decision must be made. We are looking into several financing options and will keep you informed. As a point of information to totally replace a high level deck that is in compliance with the new building codes is \$16,000. There are 90 units with high level decks.
- d. Painting is an ongoing project and we are trying to complete this project in approximately 5 years without any big impact on your fees. Painting the average block of units at VQR is \$20,000.

Thank you for understanding that your Board of Governors, along with our management company, The Dartmouth Group, are proud to represent you and your community. The Villages at Quail Run are a very desirable 55+ property because it is well maintained and we all take pride in doing our part.
