HEALTHY LIVING

Memory Maintenance



Dementia affects millions of Americans aged 65 and up. It is increasing every year according to an article in The Harvard Women's Health Watch.

Medical science has made great strides in treating heart disease and cancer but few in addressing memory disorders such as dementia. However, those with concerns need not feel a sense of helplessness. Research is revealing we may possess more power against brain decline by making healthy lifestyle habits. People who stick with at least four healthy habits exhibited significantly lower memory decline than those who didn't practice any healthy habits. A large study reported in the British Medical Journal zeroes in on the potent influence a healthy lifestyle exerts on memory maintenance, even in older adults with a genetic risk for Alzheimer's disease, the most common form of dementia.

These six lifestyle habits that appear to stem memory decline are: 1) Eat a healthy diet. Avoid highly processed foods. 2) Exercise regularly. 3) Don't smoke. 4) Limit alcohol intake. 5) Stay socially active and 6) Challenge your brain with things like reading, writing, playing games, taking a course, or learning a new language. By making these healthy lifestyle changes, people really will reduce their risk of developing dementia.








The Community Center deck joist hangars are rotten, and broken, and the decking is cracked causing a trip hazard. The Hardie Board siding from the deck to six feet up on the siding also has a lot of cracks that will be replaced along the rear wall of the Community Center. The single door at the rear of the Community Center does not meet the code for wheel



chair egress. The ramp will be removed. A new ramp will be installed at the double doors along with new decking. The white railings will be reused and work will be complete by the end of November.

Wednesday, October 18th was the final day for brown bag yard waste to be collected by J&J&Son Lawncare. This has been a courtesy service that started for a couple of owners in the community a few years ago. This has turned into a larger community courtesy service and it occurs weekly during the landscaping season. **Please note:** It costs J&J&Son Lawncare \$200 per week to dispose of the bags \$200 x 26 mows = \$5,200 per year that they do NOT charge back to Quail Run and it is NOT included in the contract. The BOG will discuss this issue.

Gutter cleaning for the Fall at Quail Run is complete.

The irrigation system has been turned off and shutdown for the year. Gina spoke with DeMelo Plumbing and they have been installing the correct Frost Free outdoor spigots. DeMelo is willing to offer the owners at Quail Run a group rate to those unit owners that call them for this service. The cost will range from \$350-\$400 for each spigot replacement.

The paint on the Quail Run sign at the entrance to Rotherham Drive has weathered by the sun and snow and is peeling and fading. It will be replaced with a new sign to match the existing sign.

The Board of Governors appointed Alison Towle to head up a committee to review the current Rules and Regulations. They have been meeting for a few months and are now ready for input from the entire Quail Run community. If you have any ideas or requests, please submit them in writing to Alison (alisonjtowle@gmail.com). This will allow Alison to eliminate any duplicates the committee has already discussed. Please understand that all changes must be approved by the Board of Governors.

The annual meeting was held at the Community Center on November 16th. The Board presented future goals, reviewed the budget and the deck project. It is the intention of the Board of Governors to <u>repair and upgrade all existing decks and stairs</u> while bringing them up to the new building codes.

We have recently been able to negotiate a reduced cost for all decks, and a reduced cost of labor. We will simply be upgrading them and not completely replacing them. This will allow us to reuse salvageable materials and proceed with the project over a period of 10 years with no special assessment.

Please understand that in order to proceed with this important project without a special assessment, we will need to again, in 2025, raise the HOA monthly fee moderately, (approximately \$50/month). This will allow us to use reserve funds to complete this project. The decks identified as "in the most need of repair", will be the decks repaired in the first year, 2025. We will then proceed to repair approximately 15 decks per year until the project is complete.

New England Seal Coating is scheduled (weather permitting) to crack seal the roadways. The roadways can be driven on after the application has been completed.

WATER AND SEWER FEE FACTS

Water and sewer fees are having a heavy impact to our budgets at Quail Run. Last year we spent \$9,871 a month for water and sewer. This year we are spending \$19,479 a month for water and sewer. The difference between the two is an increase of \$9,608 a month.

Starting shortly, we will also be paying a storm water fee yearly for each unit in Quail Run. That fee will add an additional \$16,000 per year to our current water and sewer fee. As you can see, these are significant numbers, especially when you consider all the other expenses, such as trash collection, building insurance, etc. Currently, the Association takes in \$62,550 a month from unit owners. We are spending about one-third of our monthly income on water and sewer fees.

What can the Association do? The Board of Governors has been discussing several ways to reduce our monthly water bill. First is to not be operating the irrigation system on a daily basis, but rather on a two or three day a week basis. The second thing we can do is only irrigate the front lawns of units and shut down the rear irrigation. The third thing we can do is to bring the system up in April when we fertilize and plant new seed, and only run it for two or three months on a reduced schedule. We will have to do something about our water usage as the Town has already notified us that sewer rates will go up 11% next year and water rates will go up 15% next year, starting in October 2024.

What measures can Unit Owners take to reduce water usage? Unit owners need to make sure that their outside spigots are not leaking and that faucets in the kitchen and bathrooms are not dripping. They need to check that all their toilets are shutting off promptly when the tank fills with water for the next flush. Unit owners should check in their basement to be sure that nothing is leaking water, such as their water heater or one of their supply lines. Also, folks can take shorter showers, turn off water when brushing teeth, shaving, and let the dishwasher fill up with dirty dishes before they wash the load.

It is clear that the driving force for these rate increases from the Town of Hudson is the PFAS contamination in one of the Town's well fields. It is very expensive to filter out PFAS chemicals as the filtration system that they use needs to be replaced multiple times a year at considerable expense.

Please help us get our water usage under control as it will benefit all of us in the pocketbook. Thank you.
