Why Women Take the Fall



According to a recent article in *Harvard Women's* Health Watch, women face a hefty disadvantage in a distinctly dangerous arena: falling. Falls are the leading cause of injuries and accidental deaths among American adults 65 and older, but women fall more often than men indoors. Women are 50% more likely than men to show up at an emergency room due to a fall. There are reasons why women are more vulnerable to falls. Such as bones that are weaker due to bone-thinning osteoporosis, balance issues, lower muscle mass. Women have problems with urinary incontinence and rushing to the bathroom, Women are also prone to multitasking that can cause them to lose balance when picking up things, and taking antidepressants and experiencing their side effects that can cause dizziness.

So what do we do about it? The article lists things such as 1) stay alert while walking, 2) exercise with strength and balance in mind, 3) consider physical therapy to improve balance, 4) get eyesight and hearing checks, 5) make your home safe by well lit areas, 6) keep home clutter-free, 7) wear grippy soles on your shoes, 8) go hands free instead of carrying big bags.

So what do we do about it? DON'T FALL!!

January - February Board of Governors (BOG) News

The Board ratified a motion to approve Thiago's painting proposal for the continuation of painting five buildings and the Community Center, (buildings 4, 6, 9, and 11Autumn) for the cost of \$76,000 in 2024. There is money in the painting fund for this project.

Since the Villages at Quail Run is the largest beneficiary of Hudson's Senior Safe Program run by the Hudson Fire Department, the Board voted to donate \$500 to the program.

The Dartmouth Group received quotes for the 2024 Master Insurance Policy. The policy increased from \$25K to \$50K deductible per unit per occurrence. This is to reduce smaller claims which increase our master insurance premiums.

Due to the placement of the Villages at Quail Run sign at the bottom of Rotherham Way, the sign has been weathered by the sun and snow and needs to be replaced. The first option to repair the sign would be a flat painted overlay which would look the same but lettering will not be engraved, for a cost of \$1,440. The second option would be a new carved, painted and sealed "signfoam" panel to match the existing sign. The old sign would be removed and replaced with the new one on the same trip, cost would be \$2,045. The Board approved the second option. The money will be taken out of the contingency fund. The sign is being worked on and should be installed in the next few weeks, weather permitting.

The Community Center deck repairs have been completed. The rotting hangars and a few joists have been replaced and the new decking is on. Some worn and cracked siding has been replaced and the deck railings have been re-installed. The deck is safe for outdoor use and there is more room since one of the wheel chair ramps, that was non-compliant, has been removed.

We look forward for a short winter and a warm spring.



Free At-Home COVID-19 Tests

Once again this Fall every home in the U.S. was eligible to order an additional four free at-home tests. If you did not order tests this Fall, you may place two orders for a total of eight tests. To place your order online go to: https://special.usps.com/testkits or if you need help placing an order you can call 800-232-0233. All tests will ship free. Please note that the only information required is your full name and mailing address. This government website will not ask for your birthdate, SSN, Medicare number or health insurance information.

FYI: Tests may show "expired" dates on the box, but the FDA has extended those dates. To find the new expiration date of your tests follow the link on the USPS order page to the FDA list of extended dates.

Are You Prepared for a Power Outage?

You may recall during the week before Christmas, much of Hudson. including Quail Run, lost power in the middle of the night. Fortunately, we do not have



night. Fortunately, we do not have to deal with too many power failures but it is still important to be prepared with the right "*Power Outage Supplies*" when and if one happens.

One of the biggest issues to deal with is losing light; so, finding alternate sources of light quickly and easily is vital. Here's a few to consider:

- Obviously, multiple *Flashlights* with *working batteries* are essential items. It is a good idea to leave one next to your bed, on the kitchen counter and close to your favorite chair in the living room so that you can grab one to walk safely around the house.
- Instead of using candles to light your room, purchase a few *Battery-Operated Candles* which are safer to manage.
- Even better to light up a bigger area would be a *Battery-Operated Lantern*. You can purchase one manufactured by Coleman, Duracell, Energizer or Eveready at Target, Wal-Mart or Lowes starting at \$15.99.
- A very handy device to have is a *Power Failure Night Light*. Replace your current nightlight with one of these and it will work as a standard night light when the power goes out and the light will remain on. There are many options to choose from including automatic dusk to dawn nightlights, motion sensor nightlights and some that function as a flashlight with back-up batteries. There are many models available made by Energizer, GE, Sunbeam or Sylvania which you can find at Target, Wal-Mart or Lowes.
- Finally, don't forget to stock up on **Batteries**!

Hopefully these tips will help make life in the dark a little easier and safer for you!



Special Announcement from the Board of Governors

Water and Sewer Rates and the Reserve Fund at the Villages at Quail Run

We are in the process of closing the finances of the Villages at Quail Run for the year 2023 and an examination of the figures is disclosing some very troubling trends.

The Association had some very unexpected expenses in 2023. Due to a lightning strike on Strawberry Lane and Rotherham Way, damages totaling \$15,000 in building damages and almost \$15,000 in damages to our fire alarm system were incurred. As a result of failing cables that connect the fire alarm system to the fire kiosk at the Autumn Drive entrance it was decided to replace the cables in the street with a radio system connecting all the buildings with the fire kiosk. This required an outlay of \$15,000.00. Our standby generator experienced a cooling radiator leak and issues with the control system. The cost of repairing this damage totaled \$24,000. This expenditure was made to ensure that our water supply would not be interrupted by a power failure in our Hudson Power and Light electricity supply cables. We also had the unexpected failure of the Community Center deck. This failure rendered the deck unsafe and required an immediate rebuild totaling \$29,800.00. All of the above resulted in \$98,800.00 in unexpected expenditures which came out of the reserve fund.

Our reserve fund has dropped down to \$395,000.00. As a result of this, the BOG has decided to hold off paving Autumn Drive until next year. It is anticipated that next year the reserve fund will be over \$500,000.00 which is considered a safe minimum. Ideally, we would have closer to \$750,000.00 in the reserve fund.

As regards water and sewer rates, we were somewhat blindsided by the massive increases to the rates charged by the Town of Hudson. The bad news is that we have been notified that they will be going up 12% for sewer and 15% for water in the 4th quarter. Also, we will be assessed about \$15,000 as our share of the new Storm Water control fund. Last year we spent \$234,000.00 for water and sewer. The bulk of this charge was for lawn irrigation. We spent \$24,000.00 to bring the system up and to close the system down as well as to perform needed repairs.

These water and sewer expenditures are unsustainable and threaten the financial stability of the Villages at Quail Run. Because of these expenditures the BOG has decided not to bring up the irrigation system this Spring. This was a difficult decision but one that needed to be made to ensure the financial well being of the Association.

We will also tighten our belts in other areas so that non-essential expenses are minimized. This will continue until our Reserve and Operating funds are once again at safe levels. We will continue building painting and maintenance so as to protect our most important assets.
