

I have been a participant in the Nurses' Health Study for many years. A recent article by the Harvard TH Chan School of Public Health entitled *Experiencing* Gratitude Associated with Greater Longevity Among Older Adults used the research done by the Nurses' Health Study. It was published July 3 in JAMA Psychiatry. The researchers assessed levels of gratitude and morality among 49,275 older women (nurses). The study found that participants whose gratitude questionnaire scores were in the highest group had a 9% lower risk of all-cause mortality over the following four years than those who scored in the bottom group. Gratitude appeared protective against every specific cause of mortality studied, such as respiratory diseases, neurodegenerative diseases, infection and injury, and most significantly, cardiovascular diseases.

Prior research indicates that there are ways of intentionally fostering gratitude such as writing down or discussing what you are grateful for a few times a week. So get your notepad and your pen or your computer and start reviewing your life and writing down what you are grateful for. It just might extend your life a few years!

I asked my Grandpa "After 65 years you still call Grandma 'darling,' 'beautiful,' and 'honey.' What's vour secret?"

He said, "I forgot her name five years ago and now I'm afraid to ask her."

July-August Board of Governors (BOG) News

Aqualis storm water management had not responded to Gina DeFrancesco from the Dartmouth Group to get the Villages at Quail Run a quote to clean out the retention pond. This work is required so that the Villages at Quail Run can receive a rebate on the water bill. Gina from the Dartmouth Group is seeking out new companies to do the work.

The repair of the high deck at 1G Autumn and the low deck at 1F Rotherham has been completed. Repairs included replacing rotted deck joists, changing 4x4 deck posts with 6x6 posts, adding new AZEK composite to decking and stairs and new trim around perimeter of deck. The cost of repairs for the high and low deck will be a guideline for deck repair budget estimates in the future.

The Town of Hudson has replaced all water meters so that they can be read remotely from the road. The changing of the water meters was scheduled through the Dartmouth Group and the vendor, (MII), hired by the town water department. Our meters serve an entire building, (6-8 units), and all affected must be notified of the water shut off in advance. A notice with a schedule was sent to all Host and unit owners.

The Board reviewed the reserve study and is sending some changes back to Michael Callahan (RS) & Associates, LLC for them to review and then send an updated version back to the Board.

The revised window and door resolution prepared by Perkins & Anctil, P.C. Attorneys at Law, was distributed to each unit owner for their records. These specifications are also on the Quail Run website.

The Board reviewed the Rules and Regulations document. A few changes were made and the document will be finalized at a future Board meeting.

Stumpy's Tree Service is coming out to the Villages at Quail Run and will provide a proposal for pruning trees in the circles and along our roadways.

The Board voted for officer positions on the Villages at Quail Run Board. They are as follows: President Diane Bemis, Vice President Mike McCormack, Treasurer John DeRusha, Clerk Klaus Schneller, Member at Large Mary Ellen Moynihan.

Technology

Artificial Intelligence (AI)



It seems you can't go anywhere these days without seeing or hearing something about generative AI (GenAI).

While AI has been around for many years, the use of more powerful data servers and the release of ChatGPT software in November 2022 dramatically increased GenAI's popularity. ChatGPT acquired a million users only five days after release.

First, let's distinguish between non-GenAI and GenAI. Non-GenAI makes predictions and decisions using existing data. For example, non-GenAI can suggest products to buy, based on the consumer's preferences and past purchases. GenAI is "trained" to create something new: text, visual, audio or other content. Directing ChatGPT to scan your favorite online recipes to generate a food shopping list, is an example of this.

In the simplest of terms, GenAI mimics the human brain in learning and processing information. The tools are fed massive amounts of data (words, images, video/audio recordings etc. usually scraped from the internet) and trained to discern patterns. This is an iterative process.

There are a number of GenAI tools (such as Google Gemini, Meta AI, Microsoft Copilot), but ChatGPT will be our focus here. You can download the software from https://openai.com/chatgpt/ and from the App or Play Store. There are free and paid versions.

When using ChatGPT, you're presented with a prompt textbox where you can ask questions or issue commands. Use simple and clear language for the best results. For example, you can ask ChatGPT to "Create an itinerary for my 2-week visit to Seattle, WA in October 2024."

You're advised not to put private/personal info into the chat prompt. You can also go to *Settings* | *Data Controls* and disable *Chat History & Training* so your conversations won't be used to train and improve ChatGPT's software.

Like many technologies, GenAI can have positive or negative effects, depending on its use. Thousands of scientists, AI researchers and tech execs (including Elon Musk) have signed an open letter initially published in March of 2023 calling for a pause on further GenAI development, until worldwide policymakers develop "robust AI governance systems."

In October 2023 President Biden issued an executive order with regulations for "Safe, Secure and Trustworthy Development and Use of Artificial Intelligence." In March of this year, the UN followed the US's lead and adopted a resolution on "Safe, Secure and Trustworthy Artificial Intelligence Systems for Sustainable Development."

GenAI makes mistakes (AI hallucinations). If using GenAI, be aware of current limitations and never solely rely on its output. Just as you're advised to look behind you when using vehicle back-up technology, you should always vet what you get from GenAI tools.



Marlborough's Floating Boardwalk

Have you ever walked on a floating boardwalk? If not, our neighbor Marlborough has one that you can try. It is located on Lake Williams which is on the west side of the city bordering Route 20. The Floating Boardwalk opened in May and is about a half-mile long. It covers the southern half of the lake near the courthouse and completes the Lake Williams Trail connecting the woodland trail creating a 2-mile loop. To walk the full 2 miles i.e. the wooded trail and the Boardwalk; it is recommended that you park at the entrance on Lizotte Drive. To walk only on the Boardwalk you can park at the Courthouse on Williams Street on the weekends or after 4:30 on weekdays. WHO IS THE RESIDENT MAINTENANCE PERSON AT QUAIL RUN?



Inquiring minds want to know. The short answer is there is no resident maintenance person at Quail Run. We rely on outside contractors to do the necessary work to keep QR in tip top condition. These contractors have dozens and sometimes hundreds of clients that they are serving. When QR requests their services, we are put on a jobs list that is usually completed in the order in which the jobs are received.

For example, our carpenter, Scott Forbes and his sons, serve over 6,000 condominium units. Their availability is usually pretty good for QR because of the excellent relationship we have built over many years. However, they also have a jobs list of people who want their services, and, if it is not an emergency situation, they add us to their list of jobs and come to QR when we are the next customer on their list.

Our plumber, electrician, road maintenance, etc., all operate in the same manner.

So, what does this mean? What it means is, if you call in or email an issue on Friday, you will not see the issue resolved on Monday, unless of course it is an emergency situation. QR has to wait its turn, like every other customer. Rest assured, however, that your issue has been logged, prioritized, and sent to the appropriate contractor for action.

So, who should you notify about a problem?

- For non-emergency maintenance concerns send an email to the Dartmouth Group at clientservices@thedartmouthgroup.com or contact the Portfolio Assistant, Ashley Neves at (781) 533-7247 or aneves@thedartmouthgroup.com or if Ashley is not available contact the Property Manager, Gina DeFrancesco at (781) 533-7248 or gdefrancesco@thedartmouthgroup.com.
- For emergency situations always contact the local Fire Department or Eversource Gas and then follow-up with the Dartmouth Group or one of the Board of Governors.

• Please refer to Page 3 of the Quail Run Directory for other details about emergencies.

Due to the high cost of having contractors come out to the property, we have begun to aggregate some requests. Typically, pest control, rotted wood, etc., fall into that category. With today's contractor prices, we simply cannot afford to bring a contractor on property multiple times a month. Our units are aging. Their maintenance requirements are increasing. In order to keep QR an affordable community, we have to spend our maintenance resources wisely.

So, please don't think we've ignored you, that we're not going to do anything about your issue. That is not the case. We will address your issue as soon as we can, given some of the above constraints.
